

FOURTH CAVALRY HOLDS REUNION

Survivors of the Famous Old Regiment
Gather at Mount Pleasant and
Recall the Stirring
Times.

ORGANIZATION HISTORY

Veterans From All Over the Country
Are Present to Attend the
Meeting Held Where Reg-
iment Was Recruited.

The Fourth Iowa Cavalry is in re-
union at Mt. Pleasant this week, the
following from the News of that place
telling of the meeting and giving a
brief history of the regiment:

Mt. Pleasant is host today to that
grand old man, the scarred veteran of
the war of the rebellion, and to that
great old regiment whose record is
such a bright one, the 4th Iowa Cal-
vary.

G. A. R. men from all the surround-
ing cities and states are in the city.
This morning and this afternoon at
the Y. M. C. A. a registration of all
the old members of the regiment is
taking place. While a large number
are already here, more are arriving on
every train, so that by tomorrow there
will be possibly as many of the mem-
bers of the old regiment together as
have been for years.

The reunion of these old men is
most interesting to the younger gen-
eration, and it is impossible to regard
them with anything but admiration
and awe. The greetings of the old
comrades are just about the heartest
ever, yet in many cases are a little
affecting as the name of another is
mentioned who has answered the
heavenly bugle call since the last re-
union.

A Short History of the Regiment.

Oct. 12, 1861, due to the strong rep-
resentation of the United States Sen-
ator James Harlan, the secretary of
war gave Governor Kirkwood authority
to raise a Fourth Cavalry to be re-
doubled at Mt. Pleasant. As a nucleus
to the new regiment Governor Kirkwood
ordered to Mt. Pleasant two companies
of volunteers, which had expected to
be enrolled into the Second Iowa Cavalry,
being organized at Davenport. When
these two companies arrived at Davenport
they found that the regiment was full,
as was also the Third, in camp at Keokuk.
These two companies thereupon
came down the river from Davenport
to Burlington and by train to Mt.
Pleasant, arriving during the night of
Oct. 17, and went immediately to
Camp Harlan, west of town, on the
Swan farm, now owned by Senator
Seeley. Co. A was from Fremont
county, and Co. B was from Delaware
county.

Other companies came rapidly into
camp and the regiment was soon en-
listed to its full strength. Co. C was
raised almost entirely from Mt. Pleas-
ant and Henry county. Co. D was also
made up from Henry county. Co. E
was made up from men of Grinnell.
Co. F was made up in Ottumwa but
many Henry county men enlisted in
it. Co. G was made up from Lee
county men. Co. H was made up from
Mitchell and Chickasaw counties. Co.
I was made up at Winterset. Co. K
was another Henry county company.
Co. L was from Burlington, and Co. M
was made up mostly from men from
Jefferson county.

Nov. 20, 1861, mustering officers of
the regular army appeared and within
a week had regularly mustered into
the service the Fourth Iowa Cavalry.
The regiment remained in camp un-
til February, 1862, when under orders
it proceeded to St. Louis to enter
active service. Nine men were left
behind stricken by disease. The first
death in the regiment was Private
Benj. Ullery, of Co. A, who died in
the local hospital November 3, and
eight more followed him and are bur-
ied in the cemeteries of the city.


