

Indian summer has not yet passed and more warm weather is due.

Everybody invited. —You should not miss the first number of the Star course entertainment to be given at the opera house tomorrow evening. —In spite of the bad weather last night the football candidates were at practice, the temperature being just about right for speedy work, although the wind was troublesome. —Secure tickets and reserved seats now for the entertainment at the Grand tomorrow evening. A. —The south bound mail was an hour and a half late again this morning, due to Rock Island connections at Burlington which are exceedingly poor and have caused much inconvenience to Keokuk and other business men on the K line. —Whether or not John Junkin, the negro murderer of Clara Rosen, will be given a new trial is to be determined by the supreme court of Iowa at its next session. A transcript of the evidence in the trial before Judge M. A. Roberts in Centerville, has been submitted to Governor Carroll, as prescribed by the code in all cases where the death sentence is imposed. According to the statement of Judge Roberts, who is in Des Moines attending a meeting of the directory board of the Yeoman, the hearing before the supreme court will be based entirely on the evidence in the transcript of the trial, it being claimed by Junkin's attorney, Judge J. C. Mitchell of Ottumwa, that the court's instructions to the jury were prejudiced by a statement made by the prosecuting attorney. The general belief is that there is little chance of the supreme court setting aside the sentence imposed by Judge Roberts and that Junkin's prospects of escaping from the gallows are slight.
