It was said that Mr. Mason had gone to St. Louis for the purpose of handling in his resignation with the judges of the circuit court of appeals, but as to his whereabouts Mr. Mason said: "I was in Dallas, Texas, looking after some of my own private business. I haven't been near St. Louis and have no intention of resigning my position as clerk of the United States circuit court at the present time." The story is believed to have been started when it was learned that the examiners who have been at work checking up the accounts of Mr. Mason's office were about to make a special report of their findings to the assistant attorney general of the United States at Washington. It is thought to be similar to the one made about a year ago. At that time Mr. Mason declared that if any discrepancies were discovered, it was the result of clerical errors, and if any are shown in the present one it is due to the same thing.
