Daily Grain Letter. CHICAGO, Ill., Oct. 30.—Wheat—Liverpool closed 3/4 to 7/8 lower. Receipts here today, 38 cars; year ago, 50. The cash situation is suffering a reaction from the strenuous strength of a short time since. Buyers apparently having over supplied their wants. Millers complain of a lack of shipping directions. Foreign advices are bearish indicating liberal offerings of Russian and Argentine wheat. The immediate pit situation is bullish on December wheat owing to the concentrated holdings and large short interest. We still believe the May will ultimately sell at much lower figures and sales on good bulges will result profitably.

Corn—Liverpool closed 1/4 higher. Receipts here today 156 cars, year ago 63. The extremely short interest of the weather or bar situation become unsatisfactory, but all reports indicate a crop exceeding expectations and of good quality. Although farmers are not selling freely now, large amounts have been contracted for, the arrival of which is likely to become burdensome as the long interest is chiefly for the account of speculators, who will liquidate at the present level or on any further advance. The short side of December is a little risky.

Oats—Receipts here today 223, year ago 131.—Pit operations are of small volume, the market easier with other grains. The movement continues light and nothing but a sharp advance in prices is likely to increase it. Farmers all expect to obtain at least 40 cents at stations and will hold several months at least unless they get this figure. December and cash oats are in strong hands. We believe purchases of December on soft spots will continue to result profitably.

Provisions—Western receipts of hogs 13,000, under last year. Hog trade slow. Heavy realizing sales by recent investors has temporarily taken the edge off the market. The situation still appears strong. Hog supplies are short and cash demand continues good. Speculators who have sold out are awaiting opportunities for re-investment. We believe purchases of January product on soft spots will make money.
