CITY NEWS.

—The annual meeting of the Keokuk club was held last evening the following members of the old board of directors re-elected: D. A. Collier, Palmer Trimble, F. H. George, B. B. Hobbs and E. Carroll Taber. The board will meet next week to elect officers.

—The fire department working a still alarm at twelve o'clock this noon, from the office of the Hammond packing company, between Johnson and Main on Sixth, where a hot fire had caused the weather boarding and the outside wall to catch fire. The blaze was extinguished with buckets of water, this being the handiest way to get at it. The damage will probably be twenty-five dollars.
—A meeting of the board of directors of the Y. W. C. A. was held this afternoon at 2:30. The meeting was the regular monthly session. A meeting of the membership committee was held last evening and completed plans for the big campaign banquet which is to be held on next Friday night. The campaign will end on Thursday night. Only those who have secured their two new members will be present at the banquet on Friday evening.
—In the district court of the United States here the Fleischmann Company of Cincinnati, Ohio, creditors on nine notes and an open account, all to the amount of \$1,513.62, filed a petition in involuntary bankruptcy against G. H. Prinzler, a wholesale liquor dealer of Burlington, Des Moines county. The petition states that the defendant executed a mortgage to the Merchants' National Bank of Burlington, the amount of which was \$2,200, on all of the real estate. Deputy Marshal Dunlap went to Burlington today to serve the papers.
—Money saved when you buy lap robes and blankets of Sherwood.
—The last issue of The Show World contained the following item from Rock Island, which is of interest locally: Rock Island will have a new fifty thousand dollar theatre. The location has been secured and plans completed. The building is to be an office building, the theatre alone to cost \$50,000, to be built under the direction of D. L. Hughes. It is claimed on good authority in Rock Island that Klaw & Erlanger are back of the project, and that it will be another stronghold for the trust in the tritities.

—Quincy Whig: Crushed and bleeding, Charles Lawrence, of Pittsburg, Mass., aged 29, and Edward Camp, of St. Louis, aged 16, were brought here last night on the Wabash train from Barry, Ill., at 9:05 o'clock and were conveyed to St. Mary's hospital, the former in the police ambulance and the latter in the hospital ambulance. That either of them are alive is due to one of the freaks of fate, for, according to the story of Lawrence, both fell a distance of forty feet down an embankment when they made an attempt to alight from a freight train on the Wabash railway at the town indicated. The left leg of Lawrence was shattered above the knee and Camp had his left wrist broken, his face cut and his back injured.
—Today is All Soul's day, a day of prayer for the dead. Special services were held in the three Catholic churches of the city. The Catholic church teaches that it is a wholesome thought to pray for the dead, that they may be loosed from their sins, and on this day especially, the Christian Rial and consolatory duty is practiced to the mercy of God. They are taught the value of prayer for the dead, even to the survivor, particularly in those dark and dreary moments, when the heart is plunged in grief for the recent loss of some beloved one, a dear wife, husband, mother, father, son, daughter, brother, sister or even a friend who has been torn away by death, and when every other resource fails, this comes to the relief of the mourner.
—The following dispatch from Cedar Rapids tells of the work being accomplished by Rev. William Sunday at that city: Rain held down the attendance at the Sunday meetings yesterday materially, but in spite of the adverse weather conditions 220 conversions were added to the list of Evangelist Sunday's converts, bringing the complete total of the meetings up to 1,400 to date. A sum of about \$1,000 remains to be raised to cover the expenses of the meetings, \$5,500 having been already collected. It now seems possible that the meetings will be extended over three weeks more, making it a six weeks' campaign instead of five as originally planned. This point has not been definitely decided, but the prospects are that this step will be taken. The Cedar Rapids campaign is proving one of the most successful in Evangelist Sunday's long career. Mr. Sunday arrived here Saturday evening to join her husband. Her health is anything but good though somewhat improved.

FACTS ABOUT THE NEW SCHOOL

It is Entirely Fireproof and is Built of the Best Material From Top to Bottom

COST WILL EQUAL \$45,000

This Includes the Furnishings—Building itself. Cost Over \$43,000 Some of the Features.

The new George Washington school is rapidly nearing completion and the contractors expect it to be finished in somewhere around Thanksgiving time. Immediately upon its completion the desks and fixtures will be installed and it is thought that it will be ready for occupancy by the beginning of the second semester.
The building covers a space of 107.5 feet by 82 feet, and is of two stories with a high basement, making it appear like a three story building, especially from the inside. It is absolutely fireproof and is built of the most substantial material throughout. The floors are made with a concrete base covered with cinders with a surface of wood except in the halls where there is no wood covering. Even the roof has six inches of concrete under a coat of wool felt and tar.
Each one of the school rooms contains six windows on the left of the pupils and to the right of the instructor, making a combination which is not in use in any of the other local buildings and which will be a great aid to the occupants. In almost all of the other buildings the teacher is made to face the light and several have had their eyesight effected seriously. Each of the windows has two lights, 36x50 while in several of the rooms, the principal's office, lady teacher's wardrobe, etc., the windows are smaller but have prism glass in the upper half.
There are two main entrances both facing on Ninth street, each one leading to a short flight of steps at the top of which is a long hall running almost the length of the building, at each end of which are two wardrobes, one set for boys and the other for girls.
The upper floor will be used by the grammar school pupils, they having three big rooms for each use while one room will for the present be left vacant. Wardrobes the same as down stairs are also installed here.
All the blackboards in the various rooms are of slate and polished off so that they resemble one piece. The Lincoln school is the only one of the other schools which has this feature at the present time. All of the doors have glass in the upper panel.
The heating system is composed of two American boilers and a fan, forming one of the latest outfits now in use. The boiler and fan are in separated rooms. The steam is driven into coils which heats the air, which is in turn driven out by the fan. Fresh air is being drawn in all of the time by this contrivance and thus the ventilation will be perfect. A special feature of the heating outfit is that an automatic damper is attached which regulates the heat. Any degree of temperature which is wanted may be set for.
The toilet rooms downstairs are lined with enameled brick and contain all necessary conveniences. The girls and boys will each have a play room down here, the one for the latter will be fixed so that basket ball may be played, a lower level having been secured here so as to make a higher ceiling.
Besides the toilet rooms and boiler rooms there are down stairs rooms for the school board and superintendent, having many closets and a fire proof vault. These will not be occupied unless it becomes necessary.
All of the windows in the basement will be screened on the outside, while those in the playrooms will be screened on the inside as well. All of the windows on the first floor will also be screened where they face the playground.
Cement walks will be placed on two sides of the building, the one in front extending clear to the curb, while the one on the concert street side will be but nine feet wide.
The cost of this building not including the furnishings will be \$43,000, an itemized statement of which is as follows: Foundation and excavation, \$1,542; general construction, \$34,205; heating and ventilating, \$5,486; plumbing and gas fitting, \$2,088; electrical insulation, \$347.
The fixtures which will be installed will cost about \$1,430.28, the bill being divided in the following amounts: Desks, \$1,102.28; tables, chairs, etc., \$200, and window shades, \$128. Thus the entire cost of the building will, in the end, be in round numbers, \$45,000.
