Destroying Locusts.

WILLIAM O'NEIL PASSED BEYOND

Death Came at Six O'Clock This Morning After an Illness of Over Two Months.

WAS WELL KNOWN HERE

Came to This Country From London, England, Eighteen Years ago and Moved to Mooar.

This morning at six o'clock at his home at Mooar occurred the death of William O'Neill, a resident of that place for almost a score of years. Death came after an illness of eight weeks and was due principally to bronchitis and congestion of the lungs from which he had been a patient sufferer. The deceased was well known in this vicinity and his death will be mourned by a large circle of friends.

William O'Neill was born in London, England, October 28, 1861. Eighteen years ago he came to Farmington and after three months residence there removed to Mooar near the powder mill and has made his home there with his family ever since, being employed at the Dupont Powder works and a valued employ of that concern.

He was a consistent member of St. Peter's Catholic church, also a prominent member of the A. O. U. W. Arrangements for the funeral have not yet been announced but will be made later.

Those who survive to mourn his loss are the following relatives: his wife, Mrs. William O'Neill, and six children, sons, Morris, John, William Edward, Thomas Henry, Joseph Ignatius and Ellen.

Five sisters reside in London, England. They are Misses Catherine, Hannah, Mary, Ellen and Margaret.

ROBBER CHARGED WITH MURDER

Coroner's Inquest Over the Death of Marshal Hutton of Carroll Who Was Assassinated.

CARROLL, Nov. 5.—An inquest over the body of Marshal Hutton, who was shot to death here Tuesday morning by a robber whom he was trying to capture, was held at the court house by Coroner Kessler. The verdict of the coroner's jury was that the crime was murder in the first degree. The physicians probed for the bullet which had been fired into the body of Linquist by a member of the posse when it started in pursuit of the two robbers after the officer had received the fatal wound. The ball had lodged in the abdomen, and was a .38 calibre. It had not passed through the intestines, as was at first supposed, and it is now believed that Linquist will live to expiate his crime.
