## KEOKUK HIGH GETS REVENGE

Completely Outclasses Carthage, Winning by a Score of Fifteen to Nothing After Exciting Contest.

### FUMBLES ARE FREQUENT

Both Sides Drop the Ball on Many Occasions—Keokuk Strong on the Line Plunges.

In a game featured by fumbling on both sides, and terrific line plunging by the purple and white players, Keokuk gave Carthage a good drubbing, the final score being fifteen to nothing. The visitors were entirely outclassed and never came near scoring, the play being carried on in their territory throughout the contest. Both sides played erratic ball, fumbling on numerous occasions, especially on the forward pass. Hawkes, the local full back, dropped the oval several times when in position for a punt after center had passed it to him perfectly, while two or three times the man running with the ball dropped it while being tackled. In spite of all this, Keokuk played brilliant ball, the Illinois representatives being unable to stop the attacks of the local men, although they spoiled several forward passes. Penalties were numerous, on one occasion Referee Dadant placing the ball back fifteen yards when it was in Keokuk's possession, owing to the fact that the crowd would not stay back. The

attendance was good and the interest was intense at all times.

The stars of the fracas are not hard to pick, although each man played a strong game. King as usual pulled off some long end runs, using the straight arm to perfection. Duncan, with rather poor interference, made substantial gains, fighting his way all the time. On several occasions he slipped and fell temporarily while going around end but would be up in an instant warding off all tacklers and proceeding with the ball. Hayden running from tackle position around through the other side of the line, was always good for at least five yards, while Hawkes also did well in hitting the line, although he was penalized twice for hurdling. Quarter back McManus made some big gains around end, pulling off on several occasions, 20 yard runs. There was not a man on the team who did not make several star plays, every player showing up exceptionally well.

Although Hawkes hit the line for some good gains, it was clearly evident to all that the big full back was having an off day. His muffling of passes spoiled several chances and on one occasion when punting the ball, he kicked it squarely into Half Back King, the latter eventually recovering it. He hurled repeatedly for a while, sometimes jumping over a half dozen players at once. With him playing in form Keokuk would undoubtedly have run up a much larger total.

Towards the end of the battle, Coach Belknap sent in substitutes. Merrim took the place of Bickel, Elder supplanted Meinhardt, Helman took Devero's place at left end, while Bowley took up McManus' duties at quarter back. The last named, however, did not get in a play, going in just before time was called. Davis relieved Devero.

The local team had a somewhat changed about lineup when the game opened, Parsons being at left half in place of Duncan, who was holding down the former's position at right end. Devero was at his accustomed place at left end, although his right leg was in bad shape, while Davis who played that position against Burlington, was on the side lines. In the second round, however, Duncan resumed his duties in the back field, and Parsons went to end. This combination proved to be the strongest of the two. Duncan had a lame back when he entered the game, but held out all right, while Devero's leg was weak when he entered.

#### The Game.

Captain McCarthy won the toss and decided to kick off. Keokuk defended the north goal. Carthage kicked to McManus on the fifteen yard line, he advancing it about ten. Parsons made five yards around end, while Hawkes hit the line for an equal number, followed by King who also gathered in five. Parsons then carried it for three more, and King could only negotiate two, the ball going to Carthage on downs.

An attempt at a run around left end failed and three yards were lost on an attempt to gain around the other extremity. A neat forward pass to Woods netted a distance covered by three chalk marks. Parsons threw a runner coming around right end and Carthage punted the ball, going out

of bounds about ten yards from where it was kicked. Keokuk recovered and it was her ball on the twenty-five yard line.

An end run by King gained three yards and Parsons went through the line for two. From a punt formation King chased around right end for ten yards while Hayden running from position added three. A beautiful forward pass, Hawkes to Parsons, placed the oval ten yards ahead and an end run by the same added five more yards. Again he was tried but this time he fell and only covered two yards. On this play Carthage was offside and was penalized five yards for the offense. On two line plunges, Hawkes covered six yards, and King hiked around left end for five. Hawkes was then called upon and he hurled, Keokuk being penalized fifteen yards.

The next play was an attempted triple pass and King was thrown before he had a chance to get it away about five yards being lost on the attempt. This gave Carthage the ball on Keokuk's thirty-five yard line.

#### Another Forward Pass.

On the first play an attempt to go through the line, two yards were lost and an incompleting forward pass lost fifteen more for them. On this point Carthage punted to Keokuk's twenty-five yard line, King receiving the ball and advancing it ten yards before he was downed. On the next play Carthage was offside and suffered a five yard penalty. Hawkes hit the line for the distance between two chalk marks, and on a forward pass, Parsons to King, the latter fumbled after carrying it for some distance, Duncan recovering the oval. This netted fifteen yards. At this point time was taken out to discuss the play, and when play was resumed King advanced five yards around left end. A forward pass was then tried but the ball hit the ground and fifteen yards was lost. A fake play with King again carrying the ball, advanced it five yards. However, the distance to go from that point was too great and Hawkes punted thirty yards to the Carthage fifteen yard line. Carthage's ball.

#### Ball Soon Lost.

A line play netted two yards and a punt went out of bounds, Keokuk recovering it near the middle of the field. McManus on the first play, started around right end and before he was downed had gone twenty-five yards. Just before he was tackled he fumbled but King recovered. On the next play Hawkes again hurled and fifteen yards was again lost. McManus again went around end this time covering ten yards and with nineteen to go, Hawkes punted. Carthage was offside on the play and Keokuk was given five yards.

An end run by King added ten yards. A fumble then occurred and the ball was captured by Carthage,

who were unable to gain on line plays and finally forced to punt to King, who advanced it ten yards. A forward pass then hit the ground and the usual penalty was inflicted. King was unable to make the distance and Hawkes punted, the ball striking King in the back, a Carthage man recovering it. Only one play was completed when time was called with the ball in midfield. Score 0 to 0.

#### Second Half.

Keokuk came back strong in the second round after a good lecture by Belknap, and in less than two minutes scored a touchdown. Hawkes kicked to Carthage, the ball going to the ten yard line, where a Carthage man received it and was brought down in his tracks with a beautiful tackle by Bickel, who made a long dive for him. The first play failed entirely, the ball getting no further than the quarter back, and the next thing Carthage did was to punt, King getting it on their thirty-five yard line. He returned it about twenty-seven yards, aided by fine interference furnished by McManus, while a line plunge by Hawkes carried it to within five yards of the goal line. From this point Duncan carried it over. King missed goal. Score, Keokuk, 5, Carthage, 0.

#### Another Touchdown.

Carthage kicked and Hawkes carried the ball twenty-five yards. McManus went around end for ten and for this Referee Dadant penalized Keokuk owing to the fact that the crowd would not keep back of the lines. King made a short gain and Nichols recovered an inside kick by a clever piece of work, the play netting fifteen yards. Duncan tore off an end run for ten yards and the referee called him back for alleged hurdling. However, he soon changed his mind and the play stood. McManus ran fifteen yards, putting the ball on the Carthage 40 yard mark. Duncan added five and Hayden went through the line for eight, a series of line plunges and end runs added nine more and with eleven to go, an inside kick for fifteen yards was captured by McManus, putting the ball on the five yard line. In two plunges Hawkes carried it over. Meinhardt was hurt on the play. King failed to kick goal. Score, Keokuk 10, Carthage, 0.

#### The Last Score.

Carthage kicked to Duncan who fell with the ball on the twenty yard line but got up and went ten more. Hawkes hit the line for five and on the play Jacoby, tackle for Carthage, had his knee injured, retiring in favor of Moon. A series of line plunges netted twenty-five yards and Parsons going around end advanced the ball twenty more, being downed by Woods on the forty yard mark. Two end runs netted only six yards. With the ball on the 35 yard line on a fake formation Hawkes missed a

pass from Pease and recovering advanced ten yards. The necessary distance had not been made and the ball fell into the hands of Carthage. After a ten yard gain by Full Back Jones through the line, an inside kick was blocked, Meinhardt falling on the ball on Carthage's thirty yard line. A few line plunges coupled with a long end run by Parsons, put the ball within a few feet of the goal, King finally crossing the line. Devero tried for goal but only kicked the ball for a short distance on the ground. Score, Keokuk 15, Carthage 0.
