

DAVID FULLER AT SHERRILL INQUEST

Autopsy Held by Dr. Bradley Develops Evidence That Death Was Due to Natural Causes.

The following from the Peoria Herald-Transcript shows that the death of E. M. Sherrill, formerly of this city, was due to natural causes: That the death of Edward M. Sherrill was due to natural causes, namely heart trouble, was the burden of testimony given at the coroner's inquest yesterday afternoon. The jury returned a verdict in accordance with the testimony as follows:

"We, the jury, find that Edward M. Sherrill came to his death in a skiff near Ten Mile Island, in the Illinois river some time between the hours of 4:20 p. m., November 13, and 8:30 a. m., November 14, from chronic interstitial nephritis, and chronic enlargement of the heart."

Premonition of Death.
The lifeless body of Sherrill, who was in the employ of the Continental Casualty Company, was found early Sunday morning by A. J. Harbers. A note, scrawled in big letters, showed a premonition of death; and read: "My heart, wire David Fuller, No. 712 Maple street, Galesburg."

Mr. Sherrill went out fishing Saturday afternoon and when found the fishing poles were lying across the runways of the skiff.

David Fuller Testifies.
David Fuller, who was notified immediately after the body was found appeared at the inquest yesterday afternoon. He testified that Sherrill was his best friend. Mr. Fuller said, Sherrill had made out a will January 15, 1909, and left it in his possession. He had requested Fuller in a personal letter to arrange for burial beside his two children, in a cemetery at Keokuk, Iowa, his former home.

Mr. Fuller stated he did not know whether or not Sherrill had property or money. Mr. Fuller is a traveling salesman, but resides at Galesburg. He was sadly broken when he appeared before the coroner's jury yesterday. He declared he regarded Sherrill as a brother. Mr. Fuller will accompany the body of Sherrill to Keokuk, Iowa, this morning.

A. J. Harbers on Stand.
A. J. Harbers testified to finding the body, in the skiff off Virginia Beach, about 7 o'clock Sunday morning. He said he went to Al Fresco where he notified George Woodruff, caretaker of the park. The two then went out on the river and brought the skiff and body to shore.

John Kelly told the jury that Sherrill had rented boat No. 90 Saturday afternoon.

Dr. Robert C. Bradley, who held an autopsy on the body of the insurance man yesterday morning, presented his report to Coroner Elliott and the jury. He diagnosed the cause of Sherrill's death.

Destroying Locusts.
The method of exterminating locusts most generally adopted in Panama has been to dig a trench about fifty feet in length, two feet wide and one foot deep, with perpendicular sides, in which the locusts are driven by men beating the grass and trees with switches. In this way millions are collected and are destroyed with a solution of strong lye soapuds. The trench is then refilled with earth so as to ally the odor.
