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ONE OF ESCAPED MEN CAPTURED

John Hendershot, Who Escaped From Anamosa Reformatory With Two Others, Caught Near Cedar Rapids.

THOUGHT TO BE INSANE

General Impression is That Man is out of His Sane Mind—His Picture Received at Police Station.

John Hendershot, one of the trio of convicts who escaped from the insane ward of the Anamosa reformatory, and whose picture was received at Keokuk headquarters in view of the fact that he might be headed this way with the other two men, was captured near Cedar Rapids. It appears to be the impression that Hendershot is still insane. The Cedar Rapids Republican tells of the capture of Hendershot as follows: "H. W. Perrin and George Hunter, of this city, captured John Hendershot, one of the escaped prisoners from Anamosa, Monday afternoon at about o'clock. The authorities at Anamosa were informed by telephone and Perrin and Hunter took the man to Anamosa on the evening train. They will doubtless receive the \$50 reward which the law provides for the return of any escaped convict. "Hendershot was first seen in the morning, about a mile east of the county home by Mall Carrier Simpson. The convict was headed west toward Marion. He was also seen when near the fair grounds. When Perrin and Hunter saw him on West Eighth avenue near Indian creek, the man had on his gray prison cap and trousers, but instead of a coat had a thick 5-A horse blanket about his shoulders and head.
