

### SECOND DAY OF POULTRY SHOW

In This Morning's Judging F. B. Schlotter and Julia Kritchell Won Prizes With Their Birds.

### ATTENDANCE WAS GOOD

Many Attended the Show Last Night and This Afternoon—Local Birds Will be Sent to St. Louis.

There were quite a few additions to the number of birds on exhibition at the poultry show today, a number of geese and turkeys being on hand, these being some very fine specimens of the Thanksgiving bird. The attendance last night was good and there were quite a few visitors this afternoon. Large crowds are expected to-morrow.

Judging started this morning and two cups are already captured by local exhibitors. The awards so far are as follows: Single comb buff leghorn, F. B. Schlotter, first and second cockerel, first, second and third pullet, first cock, second and third hen, and first and second pen. The latter honor entitles him to the six dollar silver cup offered by the association.

F. H. Stripes of this city captured ribbons in this class also getting third on a cockerel and first on a hen. The Tazewell poultry yards of Pekin, Illinois, had second best cock, while Mrs. N. A. Rank, of Niota, Ill., had the third best pen.

In the single comb white leghorn class, Julius Kritchell of Keokuk got all three ribbons on cockerels and pullets, and had the best cock, and best and second best hen. Besides these he had the best pen, entitling him to the \$5.00 cup offered by the association. C. S. Conrad of Ft. Madison got second and third ribbons on cocks and second and third on pen. Ellis Vansant of Bentonsport had second best pen in this department. These were all of the awards made up to the time of going to press.

The public can find no better place to spend an hour or two than the show even if they are not interested in chickens as the birds on exhibition are of the highest class and their appearance betokens this.

F. B. Schlotter the local fancier who has already won a cup in the show will take his birds to St. Louis for the show there which is to be held the first week in December. He will probably carry away some prizes there as he owns some very fine stock. Julius Kritchell who also was a winner in this morning's contest will probably have some of his birds at the Missouri show which is one of the largest in the country.

He never used any mechanical contrivances to assist him in handling them. His success in handling seemingly vicious horses was generally attributed to his magnetic manner. He would enter the stall of some fiery animal and in a short time the horse would be entirely subdued. Professor Gleason was about 45 years of age, and had lived in Texas and the southwest for seven years. His father, Thomas Gleason, was one of the early settlers of Lafayette county, Wisconsin, his home being at Darlington, the county seat. Thomas Gleason was an auctioneer and in his day cried the sales in the adjoining country for miles around, his book being filled for weeks ahead in the sale seasons. As a boy, Professor Gleason accompanied his father on his trips through the country and thus gained his first knowledge of horses, which in later years were to give him a country-wide reputation.
