Corn—Cash houses were sellers of December corn, being compelled to sell in the pit as the east, fearing the condition of new corn is buying practically nothing.

Oats—Changing operations, with a sharp and steady demand for December attracted most attention. There is an immense short interest in December oats and cash oats are worth more than December.


Provisions—Western hog receipts, 35,000 under last year. Market weak through lack of support. Consumptive demand has been restricted by high prices and cash traders falling off.


