### FATHER J. A. TROY GOES TO WINTERSET

Popular Farmington Priest Has Been Promoted After Building the New Church.

Troy came here during August, 1908, from Davenport, and at once commenced to raise funds for new buildings in Farmington. St. Boniface parish had been at a standstill for twenty years, but the young priest proved to be the right man, in the right place, at the right time. The people regardless of church affiliations at once gave the young priest a welcoming hand and the generous assistance he needed. In a little over one year Father Troy built and paid for, clear of all debt, a new parsonage and a new church.

On November 10 the new church was dedicated by Bishop Davis with a procession of eight assisting priests. The dedication was a great day for the young priest. On every hand and from all classes of people he received the congratulations he had so well earned.

Father Troy is a mixer among men, no priest or preacher ever before came to Farmington and won the universal good will of the entire community in so short time. ### IDENTIFIED BY BROTHER'S LETTER

Van Norris of Keokuk Sent His Brother a Letter a Short Time Before he Met Sudden Death.

### BODY FOUND ON TRACKS

Keosauqua Man Fell From a Train Near Lovilla and His Neck Was Broken by the Accident.

Had it not been for a letter written by Van Norris of Keokuk to his brother Robert of Keosauqua, the latter might have been buried in an unknown grave for when his dead body was found lying beside the railroad track, this letter was found in the pocket and was the means of the identification of the corpse.

The deceased was a well known Keosauqua boy and the particulars of his untimely death are told as follows in the Keosauqua Independent:

This city was startled Saturday when the intelligence reached here that Robt. Norris had been killed by falling from a train, and there were many who disbelieved the rumor hoping that some mistake had been made in identification, but later news left no doubt but that the body found was that of Mr. Norris.

The particulars in regard to the death were very meager and it was not until the body arrived in this city that the particulars were to be had, and even then the last moments of the life were shrouded in mystery, which will probably never be cleared. The facts as ascertained are about as follows:

Robert left here Thursday evening, in company with Chas. Haney, bound for Ottumwa, and while there met A. L. Fluke, also of this city, and the boys spent the evening together. The next day Mr. Haney returned to this city, leaving Mr. Fluke and Mr. Norris together and at that time it was understood that the latter was to accompany Mr. Fluke to Albia. This is the last known of his movements up to the time the body was found near Lovilla, as Mr. Fluke is at Bloomfield and when he returns may be able to throw some light on the intentions of Robert.

The body was found about three-quarters of a mile from Lovilla and before reaching the town, and the surroundings indicate that he had fallen from a train, but at what time is unknown. A farmer walking out from town discovered the body at 7:30 a. m. and as a freight had just passed it was presumed that he fell from that, as the body was yet warm and perspiration was to be seen breaking from the pores of the face. The man satisfied himself that the stranger was dead and then went to a neighboring house and notified the undertaker, who responded at once, together with the coroner and the body was taken to Lovilla. A letter in the pocket written by Van Norris of Keokuk to Robert, gave the officers some idea as to who the man was and a message was sent to this city to the parents. Van was called in turn and he passed through here in the evening for the scene, and took charge of the remains.

The body showed no marks of violence except slight scratches on the forehead, nose and hand, which were presumably sustained when the body struck the earth, and the marks show that he fell on his head, the soft earth retaining a distinct impression of the head. The neck was broken by the fall and this caused instant death.

After parting company with Mr. Fluke, who went to Bloomfield, it is thought that Robert started for Des Moines, over the Q. going to Albia and then taking the stub for that place, and he had probably gone ten miles toward his destination when this mishap occurred. Whether he was pushed from the train or fell is unknown, and that he was riding on the freight is another matter of conjecture. He might have fallen from an earlier train. His hat was not found and its location would shed much light on the matter and show where the fatal slip occurred.

The body was lying about three feet from the rail.

Robert Norris was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jno Norris of this city, and was 32 years years of age. His life had been spent in this city and in that time he has established a warm friendship with our people which only renders more keen the stroke of adversity which terminated the life so suddenly.

The home is desolated, the father and mother prostrated, and where yesterday all was happiness, today grief abides.

The funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the M. E. church, Rev. Thorne officiating and interment was made in the Pardon cemetery.
