Former State Central Savings Bank Employee Secretly Married in New York City This Summer.

GOT WASHINGTON BRIDE

Miss Eleanor McCormick Held Position in Postoffice Department at Washington D. C.

The many Keokuk friends of Charles H. Gundy, formerly connected with the State Central Savings Bank of this city will learn with pleasure of that gentleman's marriage to a Washington young lady, though an announcement comes late, Mr. Gundy and his bride being married in New York City on August 12th last summer.

The numerous friends of Charles T. Gundy in this county will be surprised to learn that he was married in New York City, August 12, 1909, to Miss Eleanor McCormick, of Washington City the wedding having been announced this week.

They were married last fall while Mr. Gundy was in the east on a pleasure trip. Mr. Gundy returned to Keokuk, however, and Miss McCormick returned to Washington, where she had a position in the postoffice department, and where she has made her home with a sister for a number of years.

As Mr. Gundy was not permanently located in Keokuk, the marriage was kept a secret, and was not announced until this week.

The marriage was performed at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City, and the pastor of that church officiated. Mr. and Mrs. Gundy spent a few weeks' honeymoon trip in New York, Baltimore and Washington City before he returned west.

Mr. Gundy has resigned his position in the State Central Savings Bank at Keokuk, and will begin the practice of his profession at some point, not yet decided upon, January 1st, when they will go to housekeeping.

Mr. Gundy went to St. Louis Monday to meet his wife, who came out from Washington City. They will spend several days visiting Mr. Gundy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Geo. M. Gundy, northwest of Memphis, before locating permanently.

The groom is quite well known here, where he was reared and where he has a reputation for honesty and integrity well earned. He taught school in this country, afterwards attended the William Jewell College at Liberty, and read law in the office of Hon. Geo. T. Collins. He began the practice of law here after being admitted to the bar, was city attorney and was with J. E. Luther for several
