Lunden, of New Boston, reported to police headquarters that he lost a horse blanket and quilt, which were stolen from his sled on the market grounds, Twelfth street, about 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. —People living along the rural mail routes in the country on Christmas day and for several days before, place articles in the mail boxes as holiday gifts for the carriers. Butter, dressed poultry, jars and cans of fruits and vegetables and other things are left for the carrier. —In the superior court today suit was brought by the Citizens Mutual Bank of Donnellson against John Hafner and Rosa Hafner, to recover on a promissory note, the amount of which is \$6,000 and the date of execution September 3, 1907. The plaintiff wants judgment in the sum of \$3,797.64 with interest from each of the defendants. —The Mt. Pleasant papers are having considerable to say about the change of train service on the North Road. When the change was first made a number of the Salem merchants signed a petition requesting the service be restored to the old car but later they indicated their satisfaction with the present arrangement. The only fault that is being found with the train of any considerable consequence is that it arrives in Keokuk too late to give the people opportunity to transact all of the business they desire. Keokuk and Salem are well pleased with the present train service but they are displeased with the tardy arrival of the train into Keokuk. If the operating officials will remove this objection there will be very little complaint. —Burlington Gazette: Last week was a week of odd experiences for several Burlington people. For instance, the coldest night of the week Dr. A. C. Moerke received a call to a home in Lincolnville. A woman had dislocated her jaw while yawning. She was in considerable pain and the doctor was summoned. The doctor mercifully left his horse standing in the barn and walked out to the residence. In the meantime the husband of the woman held her head, in attempting to allay the pain but in getting up to answer the doctor's ring at the door, he accidentally jarred his wife's jaw and it slipped back in place. The injury being repaired, there was nothing for the doctor to do but to take the long, cold walk back home. He had made a fruitless trip. —Two Burlington gas companies made a proposition to the city to furnish gas for \$1 per cubic thousand feet, but the proposition was turned down, at the council meeting, but three aldermen voting for the mayor's resolution to accept the proposition. The cities of Des Moines, Sioux City, Dubuque and Davenport pay \$1 per thousand, says the Burlington Gazette, Cedar Rapids and the other towns pay from \$1.15 to \$1.50. No court in the world will make the price in towns like Burlington less than \$1.00 per thousand because they can show that the gas cannot be made and delivered for less than that price. The companies offered the consumers to make this one-third reduction. They only asked that the city should compel the inspectors to test the gas meters free of charge. The five aldermen who voted against preferred to have the consumers pay 50 cents more per thousand than remove this testing expense that the consumer must bear.

The solution to the issue is very satisfactory to all concerned. —Little Alice Moore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Moore, 520 Des Moines street, broke her left arm just above the elbow yesterday morning shortly before the school hour. She fell while crossing the railroad tracks near Sixth and Johnson streets, striking on her arm.
