-Last Tuesday Judge H. H. Trimble started for Jefferson City, Mo., to argue an important case pending before the supreme court of that state. He was taken ill at the Terminal Hotel, St. Louis, and is still there. He expects to be able to return to Keokuk about Sunday. He was threatened with pneumonia. His daughter, Miss Helen, is with him.

-A Royal Prisoner presented at the Grand opera house last evening by the Reno Stock company was one of the best shows of the present week. It contained a pretty love story and was interspersed with wit and humor that kept the audience laughing at intervals throughout. All of the characters were taken in an excellent manner and the specialties were especially praise-worthy. The audience was a fair sized one and highly appreciative. "Stay at home," is the advice issued by Prof. A. E. Kepford to consumptives, in a circular sent to mayors of Iowa cities. After visiting the western states in his study of the cure of tuberculosis, this expert says: "Iowa furnishes as good a climate as the western countries. True, one may be more comfortable where the sun shines more constantly and where the weather is more moderate, but all in all, Iowa's climate is exceedingly beneficial if rest, good food, fresh air and as much sunshine as possible are furnished to the persons suffering with tuberculosis. Let me utter this warning note, stay at home and take your treatment in your own state. Follow the instructions of your physician to the letter, be under control and there is as much hope for you in Iowa as any place on earth."

-How a number of Quincy people go stung good and hard by a smooth knaffer, a man who "ought to be at the head of a gold brick concern," is told in a Quincy paper today and it might be well for local EZ marks to be on the lookout for the same smooth shrimp. The scheme was unique, it is one sense of the word, but old as is the antiquated green goods game in other respects. Here is the way it was worked. The stranger, after picking out his man, would take him to one side, and with a lot of precautionary signals, accompanied by other signs which indicated that he had something worth seeing would indicate that this was strictly on the quiet. Then he would dive into his pocket and pull out some racy photographs and reading matter, of the sort which is taboed by Uncle Sam, and cannot be offered for sale locally. Of course he would be willing to part with the few he had left, as it was his business to place the goods wherever he could run across a real live one, who would not give the snap away. ELDERLY LADY CALLED AWAY

Mrs. Mary Jane Anderson Died This Morning at 1:20, at the Residence of Her Daughter Mrs. W. J. Roberts.

FIFTY YEARS IN KEOKUK

Came to This City with Her Husband in 1857 and Has Resided Here Almost Continuously Since.

After a residence in this city of almost fifty-two years, Mrs. Mary Jane Anderson, one of the older and most respected citizens of Keokuk, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. William J. Roberts, at 1:20 this morning. For the past number of months, the elderly lady had been falling and death this morning was due principally to her advanced years, although yesterday was the first time when she was confined to her bed by illness.

Mary Jane Whitney was born at Springdale, Hamilton county, Ohio, on February 17th, 1823. In 1839 she was united in marriage to Robert James Anderson at Cincinnati, Ohio, and in 1857 came to Keokuk. With the exception of eight years which she spent on a farm near Kahoka, she has made Keokuk her home ever since and through her long residence here was well loved and known by many.

She is the last member of her family, only three of her eight children surviving, James H. Anderson of Dallas, S. W. Anderson and Mrs. W. J. Roberts of this city.

Funeral arrangements will be made and announced later. Rev. M. Rowena Morse, pastor of the Unitarian church will read the services.
