

Cowles," now owned by Mrs. Deere, of Moline, has been renamed the "Kallitan" and is being made one of the finest pleasure boats in the country, by constructors in charge of overhauling. The hull is being entirely rebuilt, and the engine and boilers will be brand new. Fifteen or twenty thousand dollars will be the cost of remodeling the boat.
