EDWARD R. MASON LONG COURT CLERK

Was a Familiar Figure at Every Session of Federal Court in Keokuk For Number of Years Past.

SURVIVES OLD ATTORNEY

Knew Judge H. H. Trimble and Other Well, But They Have all Passed Away With Him in Service.

Every time the federal court met in Keokuk for many years past Edward R. Mason, clerk, has been a familiar figure during these sessions. He was especially well known by such attorneys as Hubbard, Trimble, Blythe, Baldwin, Clark and a score of others who have passed away, also by Judges Love and Woolson. But now Mr. Mason has resigned to give his undivided attention to personal business. A Des Moines dispatch says: Mr. Edward R. Mason, clerk of the United States circuit court, has forwarded to the circuit judge his resignation from that office, to take effect upon such date as shall be fixed by the circuit judge. Mr. Mason states that he has been moved to take this step because the court has insisted that he shall give his undivided attention to the clerk's office and not have any personal business to divide his attention; that his personal interests are so great that he prefers to give up the office rather than surrender his personal business, which has grown so large in the last few years, particularly in the automobile business.

While the automobile factory has been moved to Waterloo, a branch of it remains here, employing twenty-five or thirty men in finishing and upholstering the automobile bodies. Mr. Mason expects to take charge of this branch of the factory.

Mr. Mason has been clerk of the circuit court thirty-three years. His commission dates from December, 1875. He was deputy in the same office from August, 1870, to his appointment as clerk. Therefore he has been in the office practically forty years. He has come in contact with thousands of litigants and certainly hundreds, if not thousands, of lawyers. He is a man of good ability and so well versed in his duties, in fact the practice of the United States court, that he is able to be of much service to attorneys and litigants. Members of the bar generally will regret his decision to retire. But they will be glad to know that he goes carrying with him the good will of the judges of the circuit court. While having served a long period, Mr. Mason is far from an old man and will enter into the business world with the greatest enthusiasm. He is an experienced business man. A good many years ago he was receiver, therefore general manager, of the Des Moines & Osceola railroad, holding that position for three years. It will seem strange not to find Ed Mason in an office in the federal building, but he is going out. His thousands of friends will give him their enthusiastic best wishes for his success in the automobile business.
