BIG DAY IN "Y" AND CHURCH WORK

C. R. Drum of New York, Who Has Been in Charge of Special Meetings, to Make Two Addresses.

IN OPERA HOUSE TODAY

Will Speak to Men of Keokuk, While in the Evening he Will be at Union Services, Baptist Church.

Today will be the last day of the big four-day campaign that has been occupying the attention of the Y. M. C. A. and the churches of the city. Mr. C. R. Drum, of New York, has been the leader in charge of the special services and conferences held at the various factories and shops, and also at the evening meetings of committees in the association building. A great amount of influence for good will follow the work of Mr. Drum and the committees in charge of this department of the religious movement. Many of the members of the association have been in attendance every night this week, planning and arranging for the success of the campaign and more especially for the big men's meeting at the Grand opera house Sunday afternoon. Fully one hundred and fifty men have been selected for special work today and a thorough house-to-house canvass will be made and invitations extended to men to attend the meeting this afternoon. The committee having direct charge of this campaign is in charge of Mr. H. C. Brown, secretary of Kellogg-Birge Co. The invitation chairman is Mr. C. E. Mohler, who has banded together a large organization of helpers. The Bible study feature is under the leadership of Prof. William Aldrich, superintendent of public schools. The advertising end of the work is in charge of Mr. H. E. Ratcliffe, architect, and this committee has tried not to be outdone by any other department, as it is quite anxious that there should be a packed house to hear Mr. Drum at the opera house meeting. Mr. Hufstader has been giving a great deal of attention to the general plans of the work and Prof. P. C. Hayden is in charge of the music. The churches of the city have decided to unite in a large union service at the Baptist church Sunday evening and have been particularly interested in the four-days' campaign. The real efforts of those in charge have been especially directed to the success of the big meeting Sunday afternoon. Keokuk has listened to powerful speakers like Fred B. Smith, Judge Selden P. Spencer, W. F. Roach, J. R. Thompson and Harry W. Arnold, and in a measure nothing of the nature of such meetings have been held this year. Those who have heard Mr. Drum are not slow to express themselves as to his ability to speak to men. He has spoken to thousands of men all over this country, and at some places crowds have been turned away. He is a positive force for clean and conscientious living and is such an intellectual exponent of the right principles of attaining such qualities that one cannot hear him and not be convinced. Heretofore there has been some misunderstanding as to the time for opening the doors of the opera house, but today, promptly at 3:30 o'clock, the big doors will swing open and in fifteen minutes, the song service will begin.
