

CAR SICKNESS PROVED FATAL

Peculiar Start of the Illness Which Finally Resulted in the Death of Mrs. Margaret Collier Graham.

SHE DIED IN PASADENA

Well Known Authoress Was Born in Van Buren County and Attended the Public Schools of Keokuk.

Upon the death of Mrs. Margaret Collier Graham, previously noted in these columns, a Pasadena paper just received by Keokuk relatives of the deceased, had the following to say of the death of the former Keokuk lady who had many friends here:

Margaret Collier Graham, artist, pioneer and woman of affairs, succumbed this morning, at "Wyngate" her home, 851 Monterey Road, South Pasadena, to the illness which has been sapping her vitality for the past six years.

Yesterday after a consultation of several physicians it was realized that no hope could be entertained for her recovery. She passed shortly into unconsciousness, and the end came quietly this morning at 8:30 o'clock. She was surrounded by her family, consisting of two sisters, Mrs. Hohn and Miss Jane Collier and her brother, William Collier, of Riverside. No funeral arrangements have been made as yet, but they will be announced in tomorrow's papers.

Several years ago, Mrs. Graham planned and started upon a trip of indefinite length. She suffered from car sickness within the first hour out, and the trouble became so serious she was removed from the train at the end of the day's journey. Returning to her home, recovery did not come as expected, but for a year she was unable to walk and practically confined to her home.

It was then discovered that a tumor had formed, and although Mrs. Graham regained considerable activity, which she used to advantage in the intervening years, she has been much hampered by her ailment, which gradually drained her life.

Margaret Collier was born in Van Buren county, Iowa, September 29, 1850. She was educated in the public schools of Keokuk, until she became of an age to enter college at Monmouth, Illinois. Here she met Donald M. Graham, who took her as a bride to Bloomington, Illinois, in 1873. Mr. Graham's health becoming impaired and thirty-four years ago the young couple left their Illinois home, and sought the sunny climate of Pasadena. They immediately became leading members of the little colony here, which quickly appreciated their culture and charm.

Mrs. Graham's literary talent early displayed itself, and her stories of life in California found ready market in the leading periodicals and magazines. For many years she was a constant contributor to the San Francisco Argonaut, articles and stories of the West.

Her "Stories of the Foothills" were published many years ago, and won her recognition East and West. "The

Wizard's Daughter," published in 1905, is perhaps her most ambitious attempt, but "Gifts and Givers," in 1906 proved a most acceptable book to the public at large.

Aside from her recognized literary ability, Mrs. Graham was actively known in club circles. She was the first president of the Friday Morning club of Los Angeles, and continued for years to preside over its destinies, and increase its membership and scope of activities. She has been prominent in educational circles during her entire western life, as well as in club work.

In pioneer circles, Mrs. Graham was also a prominent factor, and last year threw open her beautiful home and grounds to the Pioneer society for its first annual picnic. At this event she read a delightful account of the early days in Pasadena, filled with amusing anecdotes and laughable reminiscences.

Simple tastes and large aims were the characteristics of this charming woman. She was widely known for her charities, her goodness, her patient endurance and her courage, as well as her intellectual abilities. While her life for several years past has been largely that of a "shut in," it has not prevented her influence from being widely felt. After the death of her husband, Mrs. Graham continued to live in the beautiful home they had built and improved on Monterey Road, and where she died this morning. She leaves a large fortune, the results of wise investments in real estate.

DEATH OF DOCTOR FEGERS, SUDDEN

Community is in Sorrow Over the Passing of One of the Best Known and Best Liked Citizens.

LIVED HERE 23 YEARS

Came to This City With His Family a Number of Years Ago and Had Practiced Medicine Twenty Years in Keokuk.

Again death has entered a Keokuk home and taken from its midst one of the most prominent and beloved professional men that the city has known for many years.

On Friday evening, at 10:15 o'clock, in the dining room of his residence, 126 South Seventh street, Dr. Robert H. Fegers, one of the city's prominent physicians, succumbed to an attack of apoplexy. For the past two weeks or more the doctor had been ailing and had not been in his usual good health, but it was thought that his trouble was not permanent and that he would recover shortly. On Friday evening, however, after returning to his residence from several professional calls, he started to his office, which adjoins the residence, to lock the door. Just previous to going into the adjoining room, he spoke to his son, saying that he had forgotten to lock the office door. He fell to the floor, but was past all medical assistance and his death was sudden and unexpected, coming as it did without any warning.

Those who survive to mourn their loss of this well known citizen, and friend are: His wife, Mrs. Gertrude V. Fegers; sons, Dr. C. H. Fegers, Jr., of McHenry, Ill.; Dr. G. W. Fegers, of Nauvoo, Ill.; Dr. Robert M. Fegers, of this city; daughters, Rose and May, of this city. Two brothers, Rev. M. H. Fegers, of Sterling, Ill., and Dr. C. H. Fegers, Sr., of McHenry, Ill.
