A TEXAS PAPER MAKES COMMENT

Beaumont Enterprise Devotes a Column to the Keokuk Water Power Dam Giving Details of the Great Project.

Former Keokuk Journalist Sees That the Texans are Informed of the Gigantic Feat of Engineering.

A recent issue of the Enterprise of Beaumont, Texas, contained the following notice of the Keokuk water power project, written by R. B. B. Wood of Silsbee, Texas, who although far from home, does not forget Keokuk:

Keokuk, Iowa, is an old and pretty little city on the Mississippi river at the foot of the Des Moines rapids and is wild with enthusiasm and the boom spirit just now over the success of a gigantic enterprise of national importance, which was announced on General Jackson's day, January 8, as having the financial backing of a syndicate of capitalists in the east and work would speedily begin. It has hung fire a long time and kept the people waiting with eager anxiety. Being on the big Mississippi river, an important navigable stream, the giant waterway between the far north and the extreme south, it was of course necessary to have the consent of the United States congress and the approval of the president to dam the Mississippi, giving boats as easy passage as they have now, a government canal being used at present, beginning at Keokuk and extending about eight miles north.

The purpose of the dam is to bridle the rapids and utilize the power wasted to generate power for manufacturing and other uses. For half a century this question has been in the minds of the people hereabouts, long before electric power was thought of, but nothing real tangible was done until July 6, 1899, when a few citizens of Keokuk, Iowa, and Hamilton, Ill., a little town on the opposite side of the river, got together and organized the Keokuk and Hamilton Water Power company, which was incorporated the following year. Congress passed an act in 1901 granting the right to build a wing dam. The plan was afterwards changed necessitating another consent from congress which was secured in the winter of 1905. President Roosevelt signing it February 9 of that year. The people then shouted, not anticipating a drag of five years amid doubts and fears.

Soon afterwards Hugh L. Cooper, a prominent New York civil engineer, took the matter in hand and October 26, 1906, the franchise was turned over to him. The surveys had all been made and all that was needed was the necessary cash, which amounted to millions, to be more exact, about \$12,000,000. Not many days elapsed after the 8th of January when the announcement was made that the money had been secured, until the preliminary work on the great power plant was begun. About the first of May from 1,000 to 2,000 men will be employed in the construction of the enterprise. It will require about three years to complete the work and Keokuk thinks it will lift her 15,000 population into a city of huge dimensions. Sales of real estate and options are going on at a lively rate. It will be a wonderful work scarcely equalled by any similar enterprise in the world.

The dam is to be 5,000 feet long, requiring many thousands of tons of various kinds of material to construct it. The dam will be thirty-seven feet high,
