CATHOLICS IN UNITED STATES. There Are Over Twenty-Two Millions Under United States Flag at Present Time.

There are 22,587,079 Catholics under the United States flag, according to advance sheets of the Wiltzins Official Catholic Directory, published in Milwaukee. The count includes the Catholics of the United States proper, Alaska, the Philippines, Porto Rico and the Hawaii Islands.

The Catholic population of the leading states in the Union is as follows: New York, 2,722,649; Pennsylvania, 1,494,796; Illinois dropped from second to third place with 1,443,752. Massachusetts is next with 1,373,772. Ohio has 1,129,256; Louisiana, 557,431; Wisconsin, 522,217; New Jersey, 456,000; Michigan, 489,541; Missouri, 452,703; Minnesota, 427,627; California, 391,500; Connecticut, 370,000; Texas, 283,917; Iowa, 242,009; Rhode Island, 242,000; Indiana, 218,578; Kentucky, 194,296.
