ESCAPED BY THE FIRE ESCAPE

Bert Bailey, Formerly of Keokuk, Continues to Give Keokuk Police Trouble.

Quincy Herald: On the 18th of January, after a trial in the police court, Bert Bailey was fined \$25 and costs on the charge of vagrancy and on condition that he leave the city and remain away, the penalty was suspended. Bailey was given to understand that if found in the city after that day he would be sentenced to the house of correction for fifty-four and one-half days in default of payment of fine.

He did not leave the city, but has been lying low and behaving himself until the last few days, when reports reached the police that he has been up to some of his old tricks. Chief Koch, Detectives Bumster and Scharnhorst and Patrolman Tom Ryan went to the old Oriental hotel, Front and Broadway, yesterday afternoon with the intention of arresting the young man. His parents live in the old building, and there he makes his home.

That Bailey was in the hotel was known to the officers and on entering they went direct to the fourth floor. Bailey either heard or saw them coming, and taking long chances, made his getaway by the fire escape route. He climbed down the ladder to the first floor and thence dropped to the ground, a distance of sixteen feet. Unhurt by the fall, he scrambled to his feet and sprinted south on Front street to Vermont, thence running east to Commercial alley and continuing south in the alley.

By the time the officers got out of the hotel all trace of the fugitive, after he dodged into Commercial alley, had been lost. The officers have instructions to arrest him on sight, and as he does not appear to be able to make a living away from home, it is taken for granted that he will be in custody before long.

Bailey was arrested and fined for the theft of articles from a family that was moving from Fifth street between Hampshire and Vermont last summer. After the theft he disappeared and kept out of the way of the police until the 17th of January. He has been in trouble a number of times.

\$89,000 Available.

—Quincy Whig: Dr. Flinn M. Hart, a well known physician at West Point, Ill., and a brother of Drs. Henry and H. V. Hart, of this city, died at St. Mary's hospital in this city Sunday afternoon at 5 o'clock. He had been in poor health for the past five years and was brought here recently for treatment at St. Mary's hospital under the treatment of his brother and other local physicians. He was suffering gradually until the end came. Dr. Hart was one of the leading doctors in Hancock county and his death will be widely mourned in that county as well as in this city. He was the son of the late John F. Hart and had been a practicing physician for the past seventeen years. He was born at West Point on September 10, 1868, making his age 41 years, 4 months and 16 days.

—Geo. L. Van Auken, a pioneer citizen of Columbus Junction, and a highly esteemed man died Sunday morning at 1:30 after a long illness. George L. Van Auken was born in Huron county, Ohio, September 3, 1844, and died in Columbus Junction, Iowa, February 6, 1910, being sixty-six years old. At the beginning of the civil war he entered the army, enlisting in Company F of the Ninth Indiana infantry. He was engaged in thirty-two battles, so e of them the most hotly contested battles of the war. In the battle of Stone River he was wounded, being shot in the cheek, and in the battle of Missionary Ridge his foot was run over by an artillery wagon and crushed. He served until the close of the war. Upon his return home he was united in marriage to Miss Mary E. Welton of LaPort, Indiana. To this union five children were born, two of whom are living—George, of Columbus Junction, and Mrs. Daniel McAvoy, of Chicago, Mr. Van Auken has followed the shoemaker's trade all his life. For a number of years he served as city marshal. He was strictly honorable in all his dealings and was always a good citizen in the community. He served a term in Washington, D. C., guard at the white house.
