

—The one-cent savings bank plan for the public schools, which has been used in the Keokuk schools for the past several years, has just been adopted by the public schools of Waterloo.  
—Candidates are becoming numerous daily and the commission primary should be a lively one. John W. Rovane has come forward as a candidate for the office of mayor. He was an alderman for three terms. Dr. Frank Brown has also announced his candidacy.  
—A suit to quiet title was instituted in the district court today by Jacob B. H. Shaw and Malinda H. Shaw vs. the unknown claimants to the south 120 acres in the northwest quarter of section 12 and other property, all about two miles east of Pilot Grove. There was filed about three pounds of petition, it being the largest on the docket for the coming term.  
—Fort Madison Gem City: At about 5:15 o'clock this afternoon fire broke out at the residence of Warden J. C. Sanders at the Iowa state prison. The flames spread rapidly and threatened to destroy the property and spread to the prison. The prison fire department, assisted by the city firemen, who quickly arrived upon the scene, did good work. At the time of going to press it was reported they had the fire under control.

—The funeral of the late Mrs. Julia Whalen was held this morning at nine o'clock from St. Peter's Catholic church. The following gentlemen assisted as pallbearers: Thomas Garrity, Ned Whalen, John Connelly, James Brennas, Patrick Brennan, and Martin Hynes. The body was placed in the vault in Oakland.  
—The funeral of S. Allerson, the Serbian laborer, who was taken ill a little over a week ago at the water power works on the other side of the river, and died Friday night at twelve o'clock, will be held tomorrow morning at 7:30 o'clock from St. Mary's Catholic church. Allerson came to this city from Fargo, North Dakota, a short time ago. Little is known of the man. A letter, several pieces of written employment bureau papers and other things with a little money were found in his clothes, along with a letter from a brother, which was written in some foreign language. Theodore, the interpreter on the water power works in Illinois, stated that the laborer was many of them attacked with a certain kind of stomach trouble and this was probably the cause of Allerson's death.  
—In a page story about woman suffrage Sunday the Inter-Ocean printed a short interview with Miss Garnet Trot, of this city, who is attending the University of Chicago. It said: Miss Garnet Trot, a senior at the university and an active member of the league, stated: "I believe in equal suffrage in the first place because I have heard no sound reason against it, and, secondly, that there are so many sound reasons for it, such as the argument that many intelligent women can influence the laws in which they are most interested, laws in regard to sanitation, streets, child labor, etc. Besides, if the women know that they have a sure means of expressing their convictions they will be more interested in politics and they will not take the condition of the government with that inertia which you characterize women in this regard."  
—Burlington Gazette: The employees of the passenger department of the Rock Island in this city, about twenty in number, are looking for their pay checks, which were sent out from Chicago in time to reach Burlington Friday morning, but which have not yet shown up. Whether the package has been stolen or been mislaid is a mystery. Tracers have been sent out from the Chicago office in an attempt to find the missing package. By this time the packet would have had time to reach any and all points on the Rock Island, but telegrams sent to all agents has resulted in the same reply, it can not be found. It has in fact been sent to Burlington, Colo., but that town protests all knowledge of the packet. The pay for the Burlington employees is sent here in three packages. The trainmen and the freight house men received theirs, but the passenger men did not. The United States Express company, which transports the checks, have been unable to solve the mystery. In the meantime, the men want their money. It is long overdue, anyway, as it is pay for the month of January. It is in the form of checks on the Central Trust company of Chicago. Persons stealing such a package might be able to cash the paper by forging the signatures.

The visitors played altogether too fast for the home boys and literally played around them in such a manner that the ball at all times seemed to be going towards the goal of the Gate City five. It was the second meeting of the two teams and the locals apparently entered into the match with a feeling of confidence that they would win, upon the strength of the victory that was won over Keokuk in a game played at Keokuk several weeks ago. She spoke on the noble leadership of Washington as a religion of deeds; of the high religious ideals of Lincoln, summed up in love of God and love to man. Others were prepared to take part but were detained by the storm of sleet and the icy walks.
