JOHN STOLLT LONG A RESIDENT

Death This Morning. Removed One of the City's Oldest Business Men From Keokuk.

LA GRIPPE WAS CAUSE

Services Will be Held Tomorrow Afternoon at 2:30 From the Residence of His Nephew.

Following a short illness, having been confined to his bed only since Saturday, John Stollt, one of Keokuk's oldest and most respected citizens, passed away early this morning at 2:30 o'clock. The aged gentleman was taken ill with the grip, Saturday and his death comes unexpected. For the past several years, he had not been in the best of health, and ailment, accompanying one of his advanced years, impaired his physique.

Deceased was born in Schleswig Holstein, Germany, November 8, 1831. When but a young man, he came to this country with his sister, Mrs. Anna Reimers, and her husband, in the year 1859. He was a resident of Virginia and Ohio until 1855 when he came to this city, and had resided here ever since.

Mr. Stollt was probably the oldest grocer in Keokuk, having entered that business in 1865, with the firm which was known for many years as Reimers and Stollt. He remained in that vocation until in 1894, when he retired from active business life and has lived quietly at his home ever since.

He was of a quiet, pleasant, unassuming nature, having never married, he devoted most of his leisure time, after resigning from business cares, in his home at Twelfth and Main streets. He was a member of no secret societies or church, although he was raised in the German Evangelical faith in the fatherland. Among his friends and associates, he was known as "Uncle John."

Those who survive him are his sister, Mrs. Anna Reimers, and nephews, J. M. Reimers and Albert J. Reimers of this city. A great nephew, Dr. Robert Reimers, assistant surgeon of the Santa Fe hospital at Ft. Madison also survives.

Funeral services will be held tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock from the residence of his nephew, J. M. Reimers, No. 1623 Palean street. On account of the serious illness of his sister, services will be conducted at the Reimers' residence on Palean street.


