



### STACK CLOSED AT 2:00 O'CLOCK

South Third Street Saloon Keeper Locked His Doors this Afternoon for Fort Madison Hearing

### TEMPORARY INJUNCTION

One Was Granted this Afternoon by Judge Bank—What Effect it Will Have on Saloon and its Holdings.

At 2 o'clock this afternoon the doors of Jerry Stack's saloon, located at No. 14 South Third street, closed, and the incident marks the passing of another of Keokuk's thirst parlors under the rigid mulct law.

This morning in Fort Madison Judge Bank, Jr., granted a temporary injunction upon application of the county attorney and the case will come up for final hearing during the coming term of the district court in this city, which will open on Monday, March 14. If a permanent injunction is then granted it will have the effect of closing the saloon, never to be reopened on those premises, which have long been used for saloon purposes.

At the hearing this morning several witnesses took the stand, two for the defense and one for the state. Attorney Harrie B. Collins represented Jerry Stack and County Attorney Craig represented the state. Little defense could be made in view of the alleged facts in the case. On the stand Stack testified that the goods had been sold to the show people before 6 o'clock in the evening, and had been taken to the room over the saloon. Edward Ackley, the bartender, also took the stand. Marshal Henry Kesselring, the one who surprised the party between the hours of 12 and 1 o'clock, finding them drinking after hours, testified to the circumstances as have been related in these columns previously. At the conclusion of the testimony and arguments Judge Bank granted the temporary injunction, and it is thought that a permanent injunction will be granted when the case comes up for final hearing.

According to the law, Jerry Stack is not able to dispose of his goods into bulk so that he can turn his stock into money until the permanent injunction is either granted or denied. He can retail his goods until the hour set for closing in the temporary injunction, but cannot remove or cart the goods away. Upon final hearing, court, if the injunction is granted, will make a ruling as to the disposition of the goods.

### CONFERENCE WITH ENGINEER COOPER

Secretary Allen Returned From Chicago this Morning After Business Conference With Water Power Chief.

### IS PLEASSED WITH WORK

Says Matters are in Excellent Shape and Work Will be Pushed—Was Enroute to Oklahoma.

Secretary-treasurer J. P. Allen of the Keokuk and Hamilton Water Power Company returned home from Chicago this morning after a business trip, the most important feature of which was quite a lengthy conference with Chief Engineer Hugh L. Cooper, while the latter was enroute west. Engineer Cooper was on his way to Oklahoma, where he has business, and while speeding west made arrangements for the secretary-treasurer of the company to meet him in Chicago for a discussion of several important business matters.

Mr. Cooper was able to report that everything in connection with the water power dam, especially business matters in the east, was in excellent shape and matters were being shaped for rapid progress that will follow during the spring and summer months. Highly pleased with the outlook. After the conference he continued west and will return to New York before coming west to direct work.

An eight-inch centrifugal station pump has been installed by the company to assist in the dam excavation, this being the latest machinery of any kind to be installed. Lumber is being received for the cement warehouse, and work on this structure will be pushed.

While there is little of extreme interest in connection with work on the dam, yet matters are in more encouraging shape than they have ever been.

He had business in Chicago at the time of his death.


### THIRTY MEN UNDER THE WALL
