"RED" AND PROUGH TO OMAHA CLUB

Former Keokuk Players Will be Traded to Western League Club According to Morning Papers

"RED" FISHER IN DEAL

Crack Outfielder Who is Making Good With Browns Will be the Man for Whom Trade is to be Made.

The St. Louis Republic this morning says that Corriden and Prough, together with Outfielder Shotten, may be traded to Omaha in exchange for Centerfielder "Red" Fisher, who was formerly with Oskaloosa.

In this event the Keokuk management will receive \$1,200 on the Prough deal and will realize \$500 on the third baseman.

Fisher has been working out with the Browns during the spring training and has shown such great form that he is making a big hit with Hedges. The St. Louis president, according to advices, has agreed to turn over three players, and the surmise is that Corriden, Shotten and Prough will be the three.

While Belt has not been figuring strongly upon the return of Corriden, it is going to give him a knotty problem to work out. Both the third base position and shortstop position will have to be filled with good men. He has a number of clever youngsters on the role, and it will be essential to the team's success that two of them show class.

Wholesale Committee to Go Out.

The only soliciting committee that has not yet gone out is the wholesale committee, but the members of it will rally forth this week some time.

Locally, matters are in a very quiet state, there being little to devote space to, with the expectation of a rumor that Corriden and Prough will be back. While it looks as if they may not be headed back to Keokuk soon, the probability is that they will, unless Hedges keeps them. This is not directed at the ability of the two ball players, but at the price attached to their heads.


Plum for Pittsburg Firm.
