Pennoyer, who acts as local agent here for the Blair Packet line, as well as the Diamond Jo line, received notice today that on account of the present condition of the bridge being constructed over the Mississippi river at Keokuk, Ill., by the Iowa Central Railroad Co., the steamer Keokuk would be delayed several days in opening her season between Burlington and Quincy. The local packet was to have been in this port next Monday. The Keokuk wintered in Davenport and is, of course, above the bridge mentioned. Had she wintered in the Keokuk canal or even in Quincy's safe harbor this delay would not have occurred. An up river paper reports that the bridge company was notified by the government to have the bridge open by the last of this week. This is only another straw which shows how the railroads hinder navigation. The bridge may not be ready to swing the draw before April 4.

DEMOCRATS NAME COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Champ Clark of Missouri Polled the Most Votes in the Caucus of the Party. WASHINGTON, D. C., March 25.—With scarcely a semblance of a struggle the democrats elected four minority members of the enlarged rules committee. Champ Clark of Missouri, 125 votes; Oscar Underwood of Alabama, 102; Lincoln Dixon of Indiana, 99; John Fitzgerald of New York, 98. A long list of candidates received scattering votes. Slayden of Texas receiving 69. The total vote of the caucus was 140, which required 71 to elect.
