

BLACK HAWK ENTERS

Tri-Weekly Service Will be Given River Line Patrons Until the Helen Blair Returns From Cruise.

WHAT LAND MUST BRING

Entire Tract Comprises 1,300 Acres and it Must Bring Close to \$30,000—Quite a Little Interest Shown.

The White Collar line local packet service will start its Quincy-Keokuk-Burlington service on Monday. At least that is the expectation of the company's officials at the present time. Capt. J. B. Hutchinson, local agent for the Blair steamer line, received a telegram from Capt. Walter Blair on Saturday, stating that on account of the inability of the engineers to open the bridge at Keokuk, until that date, the service would not be inaugurated until then. A new bridge is being built at Keokuk, thirty-three miles above Burlington, and the draw of this new structure will not be ready for opening until next Monday.

The Chicago papers of today announce the appearance in the northern skies of the aurora borealis, or "northern lights," as they are more often called. Keokuk people have had a splendid opportunity of seeing these strange lights in the north during the past several evenings and their appearance has caused a number of reports as to their movements, etc. On Sunday evening, the lights could be seen plainly in the skies, with that slow, steady movement crossing the heavens which gives them a spectacular beauty and called attention to them of many who were out.

Randolph Morton, who confessed in writing to breaking and entering Porter's saloon, corner Eleventh and Main streets, later entering a plea of guilty in the district court, after his indictment by the grand jury, was sentenced to an indeterminate term of not exceeding ten years at Anamosa. Judgment was passed by Judge W. G. Clements this morning at 10 o'clock, after he had made a very careful examination of the defendant to determine whether a prison sentence should be pronounced, or a lighter sentence of one year in the county jail, which the law provides when the judge sees fit to exercise leniency.

Marshall Henry Kesselring has wired to Washington, D. C., for a complete description and additional details as to Frederick Day and his desertion from the United States Navy. Day, today, employed John E. Craig to represent him in the matter, and the attorney is confident that local authorities are wrong in their identity to the man.

The O. O. Newberry land in and about the town of Argyle is being sold at a sheriff's sale by Deputy Sheriff John J. Crimmins, in front of the county court house this afternoon and the various parcels are being bid in by a representative of the Citizens' Mutual bank of Donnellson, which secured judgment against Newberry. The property must bring \$29,912.61, which includes all costs. For convenience in selling the thirteen hundred acres has been divided into twenty different pieces. At a short time before 3 o'clock the first eleven tracts had been sold. The purchaser in each case was the Citizens Mutual bank, although there were several other bidders.

The steamer Keokuk is now on the ways at Rock Island, although everything about her is ready for service, and as soon as the bridge is completed will come down, and will commence the season's trade on Monday or Tuesday, Captain Blair being unable to state which day. The Keokuk will make the tri-weekly service that has been mentioned in this paper in a previous issue, running every other day between Burlington, Keokuk and Quincy, a distance of about ninety miles. It is expected that the steamer Black Hawk will also start in the Burlington-Rock Island trade on next Monday, and will continue in that service until relieved by the Helen Blair on its return from a southern cruise. The Black Hawk will then enter the Keokuk-Burlington trade, the same as the Wenona of last season.

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

The police found some post cards with the addresses of other girls, but they would not say much about them. There were altogether ten naras and addresses of three girls in Elizabeth in the prisoner's belongings.

West's and Talbot's residences both caught from the burning barn and owing to the dry weather and the intense heat burned quickly, only part of the furniture being saved. The loss of both parties was only partially covered by insurance. Several other buildings were set fire by the burning shingles which were flying through the air, but by prompt work were put out.
