Daily Grain Letter.
CHICAGO, April 2.—Wheat—Weather map showed some precipitation in the southwest and generally cloudy which would seem to indicate further rains. With a prospect of rain, local traders will probably hesitate to carry long stuff over Sunday and a lower market on their selling is not unlikely. We believe the general situation justifies purchases on soft spots and would take advantage of any setback to take on long stuff.

Corn—Weather conditions generally favorable for farm work and while making for a large acreage will continue to decrease the already light movement. May liquidation appears to have started and aggressive buyers may be counted on to raid the market. We look for efforts to further depress prices.

Oats—Favorable weather and farm work will probably decrease the already light movement. Local stocks are not large and are decreasing. Nearby contracts are in strong hands and congestion of the May may be expected. While we anticipate selling of deferred future on the prospect of a large area we believe September and July very near cheap enough and should be bought on breaks.
