DELICATE CARE IN FRUIT HARVESTING.

California Oranges Picked by Experts Wearing Gloves—Other Interesting Points.

There is no crop in the world that is handled so tenderly as oranges, according to the latest government report on the industry in California.

First, the fruit is carefully taken from the trees by experts wearing gloves. Then great pains are taken in the sorting, the choicest oranges of all being set aside to be placed in "Sunkist" wrappers.

Before being wrapped however, the fruit is "wilted," all the moisture being absorbed from the skin. Then comes the polishing process, after which the choicest oranges are placed upon soft pads to prevent bruising. A few minutes later they are packed. "Sunkist" oranges are always picked and shipped the same day.

Virtue of the Playground.
