

ONEY FOR NEW GAME IN IOWA

late Warden Will Introduce Foreign
Birds Into State According to
Word Coming From
Des Moines

WHERE MONEY COMES

Immense Sum to be Spent Wisely in
Interest of Shooters is Derived
From Sale of Hunters’
Licenses.

After months of discussion and conjecture by the sportsmen, the methods to be used in expending the vast sum now under the direction of the state game warden, has been announced.

This was derived from the sale of hunters’ licenses and is over \$100,000. It was practically all paid in last year, beginning with the enforcement of the collection of fees in July. The shooters in many cases have feared that the money would be diverted to some use that would be of no value in furthering the sport in Iowa.

At last State Game Warden Lincoln has spoken and the following interesting details of his plans are contained in the Des Moines Register and Leader:

“State Game Warden Lincoln has

reorganized the state fish and game department preparatory to the expenditure of \$100,000 for the propagation of fish and game in this state. This fund was created by the hunters’ license law passed by the last general assembly.

“Warden Lincoln has appointed Dr. M. W. Wilson of Des Moines as assistant warden with headquarters in Des Moines and there are now two men devoting all their time to the work. The restocking of the rivers and lakes and the propagation of game birds will begin at once.

“There has been an erroneous report circulated to the effect that the ninety odd thousand dollars which the hunters’ license produced will revert back to the state treasury this coming July,” said Game Warden Lincoln when in the city recently. “The only funds which do revert back to the state treasury are those which are provided for by appropriation and which are unexpended. The hunters’ license fund is not an appropriation and my attorneys have declared that it is a perpetual fund. I find no disposition with Governor Carroll or any other official to curtail the elaborate plans which I have outlined for the rehabilitation of Iowa.

“I am now making arrangements for the introduction of Hungarian partridges and ring-tail pheasants in the state. I am negotiating for a lot of eggs of these birds which will be distributed among the game lovers of the entire state and in every country of the state. Certain conditions will be exacted of those to whom they are sent and as they can be hatched by the ordinary domestic fowl, there will be a lot of this game for the hunters within a few years.

“By distributing these in every locality every hunter will have an opportunity of hunting these game birds, which are considered the best which can be raised under artificial conditions.

“The increase in the money which can be used to the support of our de-

partment makes possible the stocking of not only the lakes but the rivers and smaller streams with game fish. The game and fish laws will be rigidly enforced and within a few years, with the additional restocking which will be done each year, our streams will be filled with game fish. It is my intention to expend every cent of the money received through the hunters’ tax for the purpose which it was intended. To make our work successful it will take the co-operation of the hunters and sportsmen of the state to see that the game laws are lived up to and that the birds and other game are given a chance to propagate and increase in numbers.”

Ben Hendricks in “Ole Olson.”

The story, of course, centers around “Ole,” and the cool and unruffled manner in which he baffles the schemes of the villain never fail to get rounds of applause, dealing as it does, with the tribulations of a young widow and the efforts of a faithful young Swedish man whom she has befriended, to lighten her burden, is told with the natural simplicity that is

heart appealing. Mrs. Jordan, the widow, has almost overcome the schemes of an unscrupulous brother-in-law, when her first husband, Jefferson Bassett, whom she had long believed dead, makes his appearance, and co-operate with the scoundrel to secure a fortune left her by her first husband. In their pursuit of this plot they run counter to the young Swede, who instinctively dislikes the two rascals and becomes Mrs. Jordan’s self-appointed guardian. The development of the Swedish-American citizen of the last act is carried along on lines of mingled comedy and pathos that have “the simple annals of the poor” ever in mind. Mr. Hendricks will be assisted by a very capable company of players and the scenic environment of a high order. During the action of the play Mr. Hendricks will render several songs and lullabies and vaudeville numbers will be given.

J. W. TORRENCE DIES AT MINNEAPOLIS

Passed Away at His Home and Will
Be Brought to This City for
Funeral—Former Resident.

Word was received in this city today of the death of J. W. Torrence, son of Colonel Torrence, at his home in Minneapolis.

Mr. Torrence formerly lived in Keokuk and is well known in this city and his body will probably be brought to Oakland cemetery to lie beside that of his father, the late Colonel W. M. G. Torrence.

Colonel Torrence was one of the soldiers of this state in defense of the republic, and one of the G. A. R. posts of Keokuk is named in his honor. He died in battle in the year 1862.

Mr. Torrence is survived by Mrs. J. W. Torrence and three sons. The body will arrive in Keokuk Sunday evening and the funeral will very likely be held some time Monday from the Westminster church with which the family were formerly connected.
