

# COOK OVERJOYED AT HIS RELEASE

Judge Smith McPherson and Federal Court Decided that Case Was Not Government Crime

## HEARING AT DAVENPORT

Traveling Man Who Took Minister's Pocket Book Told Most Pitiful Tale Before the Court.

Elton A. Cook who pleaded not guilty to the charge of larceny from the Keokuk government building, before the federal court in session at Davenport, Wednesday, was released yesterday, with sentence pending on his behavior.

The Keokuk attorneys and witnesses, who were in Davenport to testify against Cook in the charge of taking the pocket book from the writing desk in the corridor of the post office several weeks ago, say that the hearing and trial were among the most pitiful that they had ever heard.

The federal authorities decided that the case was not one with which the government had to deal, because the money and purse taken by Cook was not government property. In case it had been, the traveling man would probably have been handed a sentence of from one to five years by Judge Smith McPherson.

### Talked With Keokuk Men.

On the trip to Davenport this week, Cook talked and pleaded with the Keokuk attorneys, witnesses and chief of police to do what they could for him. He was scared badly and told a most sympathy-soliciting tale.

Cook is indeed fortunate to have gotten out of his trouble so quickly and he was not backward in thanking those who had been good to him during the time he was being held.

NEW YORK, April 29.—The last letter written by Leonard Grace was exhibited here by a relative of President Zelaya of Nicaragua, who says one same was intercepted and held for diplomatic reasons and plainly shows the execution of the American was justified. In part the letter says: "Darling mamma. This will be a terrible blow to you, the last words you will ever hear from your wayward son. I joined the revolution at Bluefield and am sentenced to be shot to death. Bear up, this is my fate, the result of war and disobedience to a loving mother. I will die a man. Tell all good bye."

100 Japs Killed. VICTORIA, British Columbia, April 29.—More than 100 Japanese were killed on April 3, when an avalanche plunged down Sungeese Hill, overwhelming the village of Nishimoyama, Japan, and burying it and the adjoining valley for a long distance under 16 feet of snow and debris. Only a few of the bodies have been recovered. It is said that the slide struck the village during the night, burying the slumbering inhabitants. Practically every resident was trapped.

## BALLINGER ON THE STAND TODAY

Said That Glavis Deliberately Lied to the Congressional Commission.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—That L. R. Glavis deliberately lied to the congressional investigating committee was the accusation made today by Secretary Ballinger, testifying in his own behalf. He said:

That when he clear listed the Cunningham Alaska claims he acted properly and would do the same thing again. That he never had had any interest in Alaska lands; that Glavis was never hampered, but was pampered in his work; that up to the time he became land commissioner he never had one of the Cunningham land interests as a client; that Special Agent H. T. Jones swore falsely in his testimony before the committee; that he only took the job as land commissioner because Roosevelt and Garfield practically forced him to consent.

When Ballinger took the stand Attorney Brandeis renewed his request that the attorney general be asked to produce drafts of his summaries of the Glavis charges.

Ballinger, who apparently was perfectly at ease, briefly outlined his public service while in Washington, paying particular attention to the time when he was mayor of Seattle.

Ballinger said he had heard favorably of H. K. Love, special agent, but not of Jones, whom he said was a knocker.

### Civil War Veteran Dead.



## LATE AFTERNOON BULLETINS

[By United Press.] BUCHAREST, Roumania, April 29.—The Dimidatu today dispatches from Kief stating that hundreds of Jews were massacred there yesterday by the Russian peasantry. Hundreds of peasants from surrounding towns gathered in Kief according to the dispatches and entered the ghetto where they committed the most terrible atrocity. Jews appealed to the governor general but he ignored them. Women and children suffered death and injury with the men, the paper says, and until the last of the Jews had either been killed or fled from the city. The expulsion of Jews from Kief began on April 23 and was to have been completed by yesterday. The work was supposed to have been done under official supervision. In order to allay public clamor, the Russian authorities announced on April 24 that the expulsion edict had been modified and that most of the Jews would be allowed to remain. This was shown to be a gross misrepresentation.
