**MRS. GRIMSLEY'S  
PITABLE PLIGHT**

Elderly Woman Was Cause of a Crowd of Curious Citizens Gathering Last Night.

**PICTURE TAKEN TODAY**

Lanterns Were Placed About the Heap of Old Household Goods to Prevent Possible Collisions.

A crowd of a hundred or more sympathizing neighbors and curious citizens gathered about the former abode of Mrs. Louisa Grimsley and her wretched looking pile of household effects piled in the street and sidewalks, last night. Yesterday afternoon at three o'clock Attorney F. M. Ballinger and Marshal Henry Schevers performed a distasteful task when they went to the Grimsley property which has been the cause of more litigation than any other case of its kind ever known here. The furniture, for the most part old and worn household effects, filthy and abominable stuff to handle, was set out in the street.

Several trips were made to the home of Mrs. Grimsley where she had been dispossessed, angry protests having been made by her at being put out of the home she has known for twenty years. Last night lanterns were placed about the heap of old furniture and household effects and Mrs. Grimsley pulled through the night after visitors galore had out of curiosity, called at Seventh and Morgan to see the strange and unusual sight.

This morning with the aged woman sitting in the midst of her stack of belongings, and propped up on a box, a photographer took a picture of her. That another lawsuit may grow out of the action of dispossession, seems almost certain.
