The party embarked on the river above Des Moines and thus far had a successful voyage downward, having very little difficulty in floating down the stream. Good time was made down the river and those on the boats were very enthusiastic about the navigability of the stream. In order to allow their boats to cross the big dam, it was necessary to unload all the cargo on the banks while the large boats were sent over the artificial rapids. It took about an hour to accomplish this task. The boats were then loaded and the party continued on their cruise down the stream.
