

 —The Iowa weather and crop bulletin for the week ending May 8 has just been issued as follows: The past week was unseasonably cool, with less than the usual amount of sunshine. The daily average temperature was about 8 degrees below the normal; light frosts were reported in the southern, and freezing temperature in the northern districts on the third and fourth, doing further damage to the fruit crops. The rainfall was excessive in the extreme southeast, heavy in the south and southwest; moderate in the northwest and central; and light in the north and northeastern counties. The rains were very beneficial and oats and other small grain generally show an improvement; but there are numerous reports that some of the late sown oats have not yet germinated in the northwest and northern counties on account of the surface soil having been too dry and the grain not properly covered. Considerable corn was planted during the week, but the work was interrupted by rain in the southern and is held back in northern districts owing to the cold weather; farmers being afraid to risk planting under unfavorable conditions. Grass in pastures and meadows has made slow growth, but shows some improvement in condition in western and southern counties where the rainfall was the heaviest. For the state at large the conditions are promising and the week closes with indications of warmer and more favorable weather.
