COMETITUS CASE UP AT BURLINGTON

Star Gazers Mistake the New Moon For an Eclipse and it is so Officially Noted in Paper.

TWO WEEKS TOO SOON

Wonderful Freak of Nature is Observed When Moon's Eclipse Comes Away Ahead of Time.

The peculiar appearance of the sun and moon on Wednesday night, noted in last evening's Gate City, is explained by the astronomical editor of a Burlington newspaper, who solemnly proclaims that the eclipse of the moon which was set for the night of May 23, occurred on Wednesday night, and that it was not a new moon at all that we saw, but part of the eclipse, in spite of what all the patent medicine almanacs in the world have to say about the new moon or the eclipse.

As this is a great historical phenomenon and something which has never happened before, every scientist in the world is deeply interested, for never before has an eclipse come a week ahead of time. Here is what the Burlington paper has to say of this wonder of wonders: "Although an eclipse of the moon occurred last evening, there were but few in the city who noticed it, as it was not properly advertised. The event was scheduled by the astronomers, but the advance notices were so far ahead that most people forgot about it. The eclipse was total. The sky was clear and a splendid opportunity of observing it was offered. According to those who saw it the shadow began to appear on the surface of the moon about 8:30 o'clock and at 10 o'clock the moon's face was entirely in the shadow. While the shadow was increasing its hold there were many people who took it for a new moon and not a few are reported to have looked at it over the left shoulder as a token of good luck."

There are quite a number of Keokuk people who will still insist, however, that it was the new moon, and not an eclipse, which they saw on Wednesday night, and will likewise insist that the popular beverage of Burlington must have either a very peculiar effect upon the people, or that there are several severe cases of cometitus in that vicinity. The old reliable almanac says that the eclipse of the moon is coming on the night of May 23, and so it will.
