—Quincy Herald: Ben Hayden, aged twenty-nine years, of Clarence, Mo., employed by the "Q" as a bridge carpenter, fell from the lower bay bridge into the Quincy bay about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon and was painfully but not seriously injured. The left knee and both arms were bruised up. It was only luck that Hayden didn't get a few broken bones. A gang of men are working on the bridge making repairs. Hayden stepped on a loose plank, which turned and he fell, striking against some heavy planking in his descent, and in this way he sustained his hurts. He hit the water feet first and was able to grasp and hold onto a floating timber until rescued by men in a skiff. The police department and Dr. Otis Johnston were notified and Hayden was taken to St. Mary's hospital where it was stated this morning that he had a bad night, suffering more from the nervous shock than from his injuries. It is expected that he will have recovered in a week or ten days, and will be back at his job in a fortnight.


