—The steamer Grace made a trip to Nauvoo yesterday to get rock to be used for repairs on a riprap near Ft. Madison. One of the long expected cars of coal have arrived for the fleet. Two more cars will be required to allow the fleet to begin work in full blast.

—Rev. J. H. Helm, of Slater, Mo., has accepted the pastoral charge of the Pilgrim's Rest Baptist church, and will begin his work on June 12. Preaching at the church this evening by Rev. Brown of Kentucky will begin at 7:30 o'clock.

—Quincy Whig: C. R. Hough, of Keokuk, was a visitor in the city yesterday. He made the trip down the river in his launch and on the return trip last evening was accompanied by several Quincy friends who will attend the carnival which is on exhibition in the Dam City this week.

—Nauvoo Independent: Mrs. L. Boquet and daughter Marie and Miss Annie Baumert and Ralph Hagader of Keokuk spent Sunday with relatives in the city. Other Keokuk people in town Sunday were: Mr. and Mrs. Frank Weber, Carl Weber and family, Miss Maggie King, Miss Meeks, Rolla Bentz and wife, Ed Wiseman and wife, Mrs. Geo. Clark, and Daniel J. Droe.

—The high school baseball team goes to Quincy Saturday to meet the Quincy high school aggregation. The baseball team have usually been accompanied by a large number of the high school students going and returning on the boat and making the event take the nature of a high school excursion, but so far no like arrangements have been made for this year.

—Charles W. Bradshaw, one of the leading attorneys of Des Moines is to be in Keokuk today and will inspect Keokuk lodge No. 106 of the Elks in his official capacity as district deputy. In his honor, a banquet and musical program will be enjoyed by the members who will all turn out for the affair which promises to be one of unusual interest. There will be initiation of candidates at the lodge meeting which starts at 7:30 o'clock, to be followed by the banquet and musicale.

—In several counties in different states through which pass the pipe lines of the Prairie Oil and Gas Co., the matter of taxation of the oil in transit through them has been brought up in the past, the right so to do having finally come to issue in Will county, Ill., where the circuit court decided that such taxation would be illegal and could not be laid. This decision has just been affirmed by the Illinois supreme court. The matter was brought up in Lee county at Fort Madison, at the January, 1910, meeting of the board of supervisors. Attorney W. S. Hamilton appearing for the Prairie Oil and Gas Co., the board deciding, after the case was presented and argued, that no tax could be levied, basing their findings on the same lines that the Illinois court's decision was made upon.
