—Keokuk will be granted the pleasure of welcoming one of their own next Thursday eve, June 9th, at the First Baptist church. Our artist, Mr. Farmer, the young baritone, who has achieved heights of distinction on the German and English stage.

—The address for the joint memorial services of the Knights of Pythias, Odd Fellows and Woodmen lodges to be held at Kahoka next Sunday afternoon, will be made by J. O. Boyd of this city. Mr. Boyd having received an invitation from the committee on arrangements to deliver the principal speech of that occasion.

—The Keokuk people will have an opportunity of hearing Miss Helen Culver and Mr. William Farmer in concert next Thursday evening, June 9th, at the First Baptist church. They will be assisted by Miss Florence Brinkman, pianist, also Mr. Wm. Lester, who will accompany some of his own compositions to be sung by Mr. Farmer.

—Iowa Elks intend to put Iowa on the map at the grand lodge reunion at Detroit July 11 to 17, at which arrangements are being made to entertain 300,000 visitors. Plans are now being completed for two special trains to carry the Iowa contingent, which will number close to 1,000 and in addition the famous Fifty-sixth regiment band of Fort Dodge will be taken along to make the Detroit "Bills" and visitors sit up and take notice of Iowa, Des Moines will send about 150 Elks to the big convention. A rate of \$18.50 for the round trip has been secured from that city and a proportionate rate from every other city in the state. A special train will carry the Council Bluffs, Des Moines, Perry, Marshalltown, Iowa City, Grinnell, Davenport, Centerville, Ottumwa and Keokuk Elks, while the second train will carry those from the northern half of the state.

—The Iowa weather and crop service bulletin for the week ending June 5 has just been issued from Des Moines and is as follows: Another cool and dry week has been added to the record of this erratic season. The mean temperature was about 9 degrees below the normal with a decided deficiency of rainfall and less than the usual amount of sunshine. While light showers occurred in nearly all sections of the state the amounts of rainfall were insufficient to be of much benefit except to retard the further drying of the surface soil. Replanting of corn is still in progress and the late planting is showing a better stand than expected, but on account of poor seed, cold weather and the ravages of moles, cut and wire worms, there will not be over 65 per cent to 75 per cent of an average stand. The cold weather has also retarded the growth of corn and cultivation is only just beginning in the early planted fields. Small grain and especially oats has made satisfactory progress and are still in good condition. Rye is in bloom in southern, and early potatoes are in blossom in the northern districts. Grass in meadows and pastures is short, but otherwise in fairly good condition. The soil is exceptionally fine tilt, and with a good soaking rain and a few days of warm weather all crops would improve rapidly although it is now too late to expect an average crop of hay, even with the most favorable weather. Tree fruits will be nearly a failure

They will tour from Carthage to Hamilton in automobiles this afternoon for the purpose of paying a visit to the dam site and inspecting the work for their own interest. The convention is to be a big one. Judge William Logan of this city will speak.

—The steamer Sidney leaves St. Louis today on the first trip of the through boats and will arrive in the local port about noon tomorrow. It was found advisable to send the Sidney out first in place of the Quincy because of the low stage of the river. The Diamond Jo boat house is being repaired and a new roof put on and preparations made for a big season.

—The secretary of the State Horticultural society reports the condition of fruit on May 1st, as follows: plums and peaches, less than 1 per cent; cherries, 6 per cent; grapes, 20 per cent; black raspberries, 10 per cent; red raspberries, 12 per cent; blackberries, 21 per cent; currants, 5 per cent; gooseberries, 4 per cent; strawberries, 38 per cent of a full crop. The average for May is only 9 per cent of a full crop. This is the lowest percentage ever estimated for May on the condition of the crop in this state. The bloom on tree fruits was three weeks in advance of normal; two weeks earlier than any record we have since the society was organized.
