

KEOKUK GRIEVES FOR YOUNG MAN

William Jacob Frank, a Brilliant Young Citizen, Died Early This Morning at His Residence.

NERVOUS PROSTRATION

Had Been Ill Since Last November, and Death Comes as Sad Shock to Relatives and Many Friends.

Keokuk is sorrowing today over the death of one of its younger citizens, William Jacob Frank, who passed away shortly after midnight at his residence, 220 Blondeau street. Word of his demise caused a sad shock among hundreds of friends of the family of the deceased in this city today and though it was known that Mr. Frank had been ill for a number of months, every hope for his complete recovery was entertained by the members of the grief stricken relatives.

Let November, the deceased was taken ill with a severe case of la grippe and it became necessary for him to resign from his business duties for two months. After having recuperated in health he again assumed more active life but a short time ago was again forced to refrain from his work and his passing today is directly the result of a nervous prostration which developed during the long siege of illness.

Mr. Frank had been confined to his bed since last Friday and during the past four days his condition had become rapidly weakened. Much sorrow has been caused by his death, and his passing is extremely sad because of the young manhood into which he had entered has been taken away.

Was Born in Keokuk.

William Jacob Frank was born in Keokuk, June 15, 1884. He received his education in the grammar schools of the city and ten years ago had entered the employ of the Standard Oil company's offices in this city. His advancement had been finely progressive and he was one of the company's most valued men. Thoroughly a young business gentleman he had won to himself hundreds of friends. His business tact and ability were indispensable to his employers and the first of the present year he was promoted to a more responsible position, of trust.

The decedent was of Lutheran faith having been reared in that church through parental guidance. He was also a member of the Masonic lodge in which order he was one of the most active and best liked members.

A year ago last February 17, William J. Frank was united in marriage with Miss Elizabeth Margaret Cosgrove, his beloved wife, whom with their nine weeks old baby girl, survive. The celebration of these happy nuptials are well remembered as among the more notable marriages of last year. Since then the home has been full of the brightness and sweetness of happy life and the young wife who is prostrated with grief is today the recipient of consolation from the many friends of the two families, who are among Keokuk's oldest and most respected citizens.

STILL HOPE FOR NAUVOO TROLLEY

P. J. Kieran is in Nauvoo and Declares That Money of English Capitalists is Back of Project.

THE REPRESENTATIVES

Messrs. Glazebrook and Stevenson Have Been Appointed Trustees for Funds—Details Being Worked Out.

The people of Nauvoo are looking up a little bit as a result of the present visit of P. J. Kieran. It is said that the interurban line has been financed by English capital and will be built as soon as details are worked out. The Independent says:

P. J. Kieran is still pegging away at the interurban proposition. In fact he never had given up the idea of having the road built.

Mr. Kieran is in the city at present, accompanied by A. J. Glazebrook of Toronto, Canada, and Hon. E. G. Stevenson, of Detroit, Mich. The Independent asked Mr. Kieran for some news last evening, when he referred us to Mr. Glazebrook.

In a conversation with the latter he informed us that he and Mr. Kieran had been to England this spring and succeeded in getting the Carthage-Nauvoo-Ft. Madison interurban proposition financed. The actual money has been secured, and he (Mr. Glazebrook) and Mr. Stevenson have been appointed trustees of the funds, or managers for the English syndicate in this matter.

Mr. Glazebrook stated that they are ready to begin work on the line just as soon as some necessary preliminaries and details are attended to. To be sure the right of way and franchises will have to be secured again, but they expect no trouble in this respect. Of course they expect the people to show a proper spirit in these as well as other matters in connection with the undertaking.

They say that the road will be built, but it is not absolutely positive that the old route will not be somewhat changed.

The gentlemen expect to meet some of Carthage's leading citizens and other men here today and the whole matter will be gone over.

It is probable the people along the route will be given an opportunity to take some of the securities in order to show local interest.

The Independent will probably have more trolley news to give to its readers Saturday.

The people of Nauvoo still have a ray of hope for the future. A trolley will mean the rejuvenation of the old town. And just think what it will mean if the knackers will have to take a back seat and sit down.

BUNCOED OUT OF \$900 JEWELS

Hannibal Woman, Suffering Untold Agonies from Rheumatism, Cleverly Swindled by Woman Who Would Cure Her.

PROFESSIONAL MYSTERY

Was Requested to Put Diamonds in Box and Not Look at Them for Seven Days—When She Did They were Gone.

Mrs. John Seibel of Hannibal was victimized by a woman who gave her name as Madam Davey, and who claimed to be able to cure any disease, providing that the patient would follow instructions to the letter:

Mrs. Seibel, who for years has suffered untold agonies because of rheumatism, was only too glad to make any sacrifice in order to be assured of a cure. In consequence she is minus a pair of earrings, each set with a carat and one-half diamond, the value being placed at \$900. This happened some time ago, but the facts have been suppressed until yesterday, when they finally leaked out in Hannibal.

Attracted by Advertisement.

Mrs. Seibel was first attracted to Madam Davey because of a newspaper advertisement, which pictured in glowing terms the wonderful cures the "healer" had accomplished. Mrs. Seibel fell an easy victim and was not slow in calling upon the wonderful woman, who was working miracles without number.

The Davey woman is represented as saying to Mrs. Seibel that it would be possible to effect a cure in her case. Before the "healer" committed herself, however, she worked upon the superstitions of her victim until she had her completely under her influence, willing to do her every bidding. Before it would be possible to work the charm which would result in lasting benefit to the woman who was afflicted, it would be necessary for her to show the great "healer" that she was possessed of jewels of great value. The carat and one-half sparklers looked mighty good to Madam Davey, so she set about to become possessed of them.

How the Schemer Planned.

With all the cunning of the "voodoo" doctor, the madame played upon the superstitions of her patient, and soon convinced her that it would be only a question of a few short days until the relief she had tried in vain for years to obtain would be hers.
