The job of the pastor in charge was not a sinecure. Some people said that it was harder to be a good pastor, to hold the church together, to plan the details, to carry on the constructive work of the church and to keep the peace among the warring members, than it was to be a great evangelist.

In our opinion there was room for all—the good, old minister who maintained the church for so many years; the fiery evangelist who brought about the new order of things, and the new pastor, whose business it was to conserve the good that both of his predecessors had done.

McKinley was the good old leader who led the Republican flocks in quietness and peace. Roosevelt was the great evangelist who stirred the consciences of men. Taft is the pastor in charge upon whom the work of conciliation and construction has fallen.
