INDIANS HUMBLLED IN THIRD ONE

Browns Take Last Game of Series From the Indians With Blue Jacket and New Twirler Working.

AHRING OUT OF GAME

Jimmed His Finger Thursday—Morris Was Sent to Short and Belt Played Left, Securing Half the Hits.

MONMOUTH, Ill., July 1.—We got a new derby. He ain't a J. B., but he is a good one. He worked yesterday against the Redskins from the Damtown and while his thinks were cracked freely he got away with his first game and first victory very successfully, thanks to some sensational work in the out and infield. Dutchman Irmischer was the especially bright star of the fielding portion of the game, going in up to his neck and pulling them into the first sacker's mitt with ease. Derby didn't grant many liberties with the bags populated and so he pocketed the long section of the 4 to 2 score.

Derby is the right hander who secured his release from Terre Haute. He comes with a high record and consequently when Mr. Eddinger with his sweet staccato-pedaled voice essayed to announce that he would be the fling smith, the move seemed to please the fans immensely. Now Derby hasn't worked for ten days or more and that he was stale showed up in some stages but the pepper box looks like a gilt-edged addition to our curling staff.

Real Indians, Mr. Belt trotted out the real namesake of the tribe—James Allen McGuire Bluejacket, Esq., late school master and scribe unto high prophets of the Choctaws. Now, James—(funny indian name is it not) works much better with old Pa receiving than elsewhere and while Cavanaugh handed him nicely the big raw-boned hurler was some bit wild with the placement of his crooks. At that the Browns jammed his offering freely to the grounds where they ain't, so there wasn't much chance after all.

Hitting Stars. Williams and Johnson hit a marvelous stride in their hitting for the Browns. Williams drove in one of the points and scored another, while Johnson drove in one and scored twice himself. Belt, the G. O. He got to second on Hildebrand's out and was leading off second when Derby pushed a wild one over. According to the ground rules the runner was allowed home on a wild heave. Derby tried for him at the plate, but Eddinger refused to call the play as the ground rules held in the case.

Drill's colts pushed in their last count in the fifth. Johnson lead off with a shooting daisy-outer that danced, rather hummed, through Bluejackets pins. Kaylor sacrificed. Bateman lifted a fly foul to Miller. Siner hung one down Bresnahan's way that the Rajah's cousin rather man-handled and allowed Johnson to register.
