—The Seventh Street Baptist church has tendered a call to Rev. C. C. Calloway of Clarinda, Iowa, as pastor of the said church. Rev. C. C. Calloway is formerly of Odessa, Mo. He leaves the Baptist church of Clarinda, Iowa, with a clear recommendation from their officials. Rev. Calloway preaches his farewell sermon Wednesday night to the Clarinda church. He will preach at Seventh street church Sunday, July 10, commencing his pastoral duties.

—What might have resulted in a disastrous fire was discovered by an early rising Gate City reporter yesterday morning at six o'clock. In passing the large board fence at the ball park, smoke was noticed curling up from the inside of the shut out and flames licking around one of the upright posts in the bleachers. A street car motorman climbed over the fence while the newspaper man ran for a bucket of water at nearby just-opened-for-the-day refreshment stand. Had the fire continued for another five minutes, the entire bleachers and other surrounding timber might have caught and extensive damage resulted.

—A citizen who always takes a live interest in Keokuk suggests that the way to raise money for public celebrations is for about one thousand citizens to contribute \$5 each which would make a fund of \$5,000, ample to take care of all public entertainments. This would save a few people contributing so heavily to all celebrations. The idea is a good one. This method would make but one collection necessary. It would also be a great relief to the business men and it would also be the proper thing to have a wider contribution. It isn't fair to ask the business men to stand the expense for all public entertainments.

—Sunday evening the fire department made a run to the Pechstein residence at E'venth and Concert streets, shortly after nine o'clock, where a small patch of shingles on the roof of the residence had caught fire. A toy balloon which had been sent up, alighted on the house top but the slight blaze was extinguished before any damage was done. At 10:55 Sunday evening the department made a double run, going to the grocery store of Joyce and Blaisdell at B and Bluff streets in the west end, near the coal works. A live wire beneath the building had set the flooring afire, but no damage resulted. At the same time the run was made to the west end grocery, an alarm was turned in from Eighth and Johnson street, where a live wire on top of a building had caught the roofing. No damage resulted.

—Mr. and Mrs. Rufus Dandridge royally entertained about fifty of their friends last Sunday at their home, 6 miles west of Summitville, it being the occasion of the forty-third anniversary of their marriage. Mr. and Mrs. Dandridge are among the best known residents of that immediate vicinity and are held in highest esteem by acquaintances and friends, they having resided continuously on their present homestead ever since their marriage forty-three years ago. They both met with a very serious accident three years ago, by being precipitated over an embankment while crossing the Santa Fe railroad track from which neither has ever fully recovered. Aside from these injuries they are both otherwise enjoying good health. They have reared a family of eleven children, three children having died in infancy of this number. There is still surviving five sons and five daughters, viz: Harry and George of Omaha, Neb.; Leonard, Elmer and Russell at home; Mrs. Rhoda Harper of Fort Madison, Iowa; Mrs. Pollie Hackney of Chicago, Ill.; Mrs. Addie Thomas of Omaha, Neb.; Mrs. Rosa Fuller of Seattle, Wash., and Mrs. Jennie Freeman of this city. Mrs. Carrie Lewis of Des Moines died about eight years ago. They have fifteen grandchildren. One rare coincidence connected with this family is the fact that all of the daughters have married husbands whose first name is George, with one exception.

CITY NEWS.

—Buy harness of Sherwood.
—Big bill at the Air Dome tonight.
—Three big vaudeville acts at the big Air Dome tonight.

—Seldom has Keokuk enjoyed such fine weather on the Fourth as there was yesterday. The day was cool and almost perfect for being enjoyed.

—Yesterday was a very quiet Fourth in Keokuk. There seemed to be a lack of noise, caused no doubt by the prohibition of the bomb case and blank cartridge revolver.

—J. B. Woods filed an information against Josia Harmon in Justice Leindecker's court today. Harmon, the informant claims, having tried to shoot one, Florence Brackelsburg, with a shot gun on the Fourth of July.

—Dan Harrington was arraigned in Justice Leindecker's court this morning, an information having been filed against him by his son, Dennis, for having disturbed the peace in the locality of their home, 217 North Tenth street.

—Napoleon Deuromont, European comedy cartoonist, at the big Air Dome tonight.

—Launch parties galore went up the canal yesterday morning and afternoon and every available boat in the local harbor was put into use to convey families and parties up or down the Mississippi where the day was spent fishing.

—The Gate City had a score or more of telephone inquiries this morning from not only the city, but from outside, asking whether Jack Johnson had been shot and killed last night at Reno. Some one had started this report, which was entirely untrue.

—Imperial comedy musical trio in big act at the big Air Dome tonight.

—The refreshment stands did a great business yesterday at the park and on the streets. Ice cream cones seemed to be the best seller and before nine o'clock last night, every available one of these cornucopia shaped receptacles with their inlayer of frozen stuff had been disposed of. Soda water and peanuts went like hot cakes and all of the other picnic necessities disappeared long before it was time to go home.

—Large crowds left the Air Dome last night well pleased with the big new bill. Don't miss it tonight.

—More of the small tissue paper balloons were noticed this year than ever before. Last night the sky was full of these miniature floating gas bags and the sight of so many of the red, white and blue lighted paper floats running about through the heavens was a novel one. Several small airships, specially constructed to represent biplanes, monoplanes and other forms of air craft were seen here during the day time. The balloon idea of observing a safe and sane Fourth is the best ever and just as much fun and excitement seems to be gotten out of this method of celebrating as blowing red fire crackers under tin cans, to atoms.

—The Iowa weather and crop bulletin for the week ending July 3 has just been issued as follows: Excessively high temperatures continued during the past seven days with nearly 100 per cent of sunshine and very little or no rain. Late reports, however, show that the showers, during the last two days of the previous week, were more general and the rainfall heavier than was indicated in the last bulletin. Corn has made rapid progress and is now up to the normal stage of growth for July 4th. Much of it has been laid by with the fields clean, the soil in good condition. Hay making is in progress and the crop, though lighter than for the past few years, is being secured in good condition. Small grain is holding its own against the droughty conditions and with the exception of a few localities where showers have not occurred is in very good condition and gives promise of good yields. Winter wheat harvest has begun in some of the southern counties and many fields of barley and early oats will be ready for the binder during the coming week. Pastures and early potatoes have been seriously injured by the dry weather and late potatoes would be improved by rain.


