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WHITE GIRL WITH BLACK HONEY BOY

Pair Arrived Here Last Night on T.
P. & W. and Were Promptly
Arrested and Taken to
Jail.

GIRL SENT HOME AGAIN

Negro and Young White Lass Travel-
ing Together, Left Canton, Ill.,
and Came
Here.

The disgusting picture of a young
fifteen-year-old white girl allowing her-
self to be enraptured by the charms
of a negro suitor was presented to
the local police officers last evening.
At 8:20 when the T. P. & W. train
came in from the east a young
white girl, who gave her name
at the station as Nita Smith, and a
colored fellow about twenty-two or
three years old, alighted from the train
and were at once arrested on suspicion
by Officer William Brennan and taken
to the station in the wagon. The ne-
gro gave his name as Wesley Russel.
The couple claimed to have come
here from Canton, Ill., the negro hav-
ing been in the employ of the girl's
father at that place and in Mexico,
Mo., their former home. The man
had over six dollars in his pockets,
and had paid the railroad fare of
both himself and his female companion
to Keokuk.

Girl Sent Back Home.
This morning Officer Park escorted
the Smith girl to the depot and put
her aboard the 7 o'clock T. P. & W.
train to return to her home at Can-
ton.

Russel, the young dandy, was ar-
raigned in the superior court this
morning and his bond fixed at \$50.
He was held on the charge of carrying
concealed weapons, a pair of "knucks"
made of steel being found on his per-
son. Chief Schevers said today that
the man would be held for a short
time and then "bounced" out of town.

Around the Court Today.

Henry Berry, the negro who gets it
in the neck from the police about
once a week, was arrested last night
near the hour of seven at Eleventh
and Main streets, where he was try-
ing to sell half of a set of double har-
ness. Berry made some resistance
when the police went to arrest him
