DISAPPEARANCE OF ELDON GIRL

Went to Ottumwa Recently to do Shopping and Has Not Been Seen Since.

An air of mystery surrounds the disappearance of Miss Floy Murphy, a well known and popular resident of Eldon, who was last seen in Ottumwa on the night of June 6, when she was going to the Union depot to take the Rock Island train to her home. Believing that the young woman had gone to visit relatives or friends in some part of the state, nothing was thought of her disappearance, but after days and days with no word from her, her relatives brought the matter to the attention of the Ottumwa police and they are trying to locate her.

Miss Murphy went to Ottumwa on Monday, June 6, to do some shopping. Before going home she stopped to visit a friend. She stayed until about train time and was accompanied part of the way to the depot. Nothing has been heard from her since. Her parents, who are aged residents of Eldon, are frantic over the mysterious disappearance of their daughter and relatives cannot account for her absence. The young woman left home in the morning in the best of spirits and was in excellent health. The relatives have corresponded with other relatives and her friends in various parts of the state, but none have seen her. The missing young woman is one of Eldon's popular young women. For a number of years she conducted a millinery store there.

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 —The soliciting committee which was out yesterday raising funds for Keokuk's assessment in the Upper Mississippi River Improvement Association, raised \$250 and expected to raise the other \$50 this afternoon. President Wells M. Irwin of the Commercial club has appointed L. A. Hamill and Hazen I. Sawyer as the delegates from the club to the convention next week at St. Paul and they will attend. Most of the cities along the river who are members of the association, send the same delegates each year and Keokuk is following suit, thus having representatives who are acquainted with the other delegates and with the work of the convention.
 —What was once the largest and best mussel shell bed in the world is rapidly being depleted by the pearl fishers at Prairie Du Chene, Wis., who have discarded the paraphernalia used in ordinary stages of water and now go into the channel and dig the bivalves with their hands. The water in the Mississippi is registered at 1.2 feet, the lowest in the history at this point. As a result hundreds of people have taken to clamming, and scores of pearls are being found. Saturday seven gems ranging in price from \$200 to \$500 each were found opposite the city in the channel of the Mississippi, where men, women and children are engaged in digging clams in the hope of finding a valuable pearl. The shells are worth \$10 a ton and brings big wages alone. Some of the beds, which were as long as two miles and averaged several feet in depth, are getting thin, and the fishermen predict that unless the water rises soon the larger share of the spawn and young mussel shells will be destroyed by being trampled upon in the mad rush for pearls.


