

The wagon was standing in the rear of the bakeshop and the boys went to the place Tuesday afternoon and removed forty of the tickets. They gave a young boy by the name of Stice some of the tickets who was stopped by the proprietor of the store when he made a purchase with some of the money equivalents for pies, bread, etc. Young Sharp and Johnson were arrested yesterday and the police think that Johnson is a fit subject for the reform school, having been implicated in a theft last fall.
—The Des Moines Capital was evidently misguided in the following statement it makes regarding the coming of a public speaker to this city to make an address. "No one here has heard of the gentleman mentioned. An effort is being made by the Laymen's Civic union to arrange for a debate sometime this week between H. H. Sawyer, state secretary of the Iowa Constitutional Amendment Association, and W. C. Barber, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon League. Mr. Sawyer has signified his willingness to debate, and has asked that a date be arranged either this week or early next week. "I think the debate should be held immediately, as the people are entitled to know the facts concerning the fight for re-submission through the legislature or through a constitutional convention." Mr. Sawyer said today: "I am now ready to tell why the constitutional convention would be a failure and why the re-submission of the amendment should be made by the legislature." Mr. Barber is out of the city but it is believed he is not willing to debate the question. He is in Keokuk today, where he is speaking in the interest of the constitutional convention.
