Daily Grain Letter.
 CHICAGO, July 23.—Wheat—A break in Winnipeg, probably due to rains, brought out considerable stuff, for which there was not much demand. Apparently spring wheat advices have reached their worst and reports now coming in are simply a rehash. Winter wheat reports are decidedly bearish and the movement will soon become heavy. We look for sharp rallies during the settlement of July contracts but believe that wheat sold on hard spots will pay well.
 Corn.—Local traders continue to work the market, taking advantage of big short interest to work prices higher from time to time. Crop advices are very much mixed. The great bulk of them from the largest areas indicate a magnificent promise. Traders lend a ready ear, however, to the few sensational reports which come from the southwest. The light stocks and small movement make it easy to advance prices. We believe the hard spots will bring out corn and think sales made on bulges will be profitable.
 Oats.—Are heavy under the pressure of country offerings and hedging sales. Apparently July shorts have settled up pretty well and light stocks have ceased to be an important factor. Crop reports are excellent and when the movement is fairly well under way we look for materially lower prices.
 Provisions—Were dull and some lower. Commission houses mostly on the selling side. Prices are apparently held steady by the packing interests but the demand is poor and the situation is against higher prices. Light stocks make the short side unattractive except as a scalping proposition, but we look for lower figures in the near future.
 Sample Markets—Offerings of wheat increasing. Demand fairly active. Prices following futures, 2 red and 2 hard winter selling about 1c over July. July prices prevailing for 3 red and 3 hard.
 Corn—Offerings light. Demand fairly active. Prices about unchanged, regardless of the higher future market.
 Oats—Offered freely. Demand slow market 1-2c to 1c lower. Shipping demand has fallen off. Eastern buyers counting on supplies to come from Ohio and Indiana.
