

NEW BOILERS FOR CAREY SCHOOL

W. P. Sutton Was Given the Contract for the New Heating Plant as Lowest Bidder.

BOARD OF EDUCATION

Regular Monthly Session Was Held Last Evening With Only Four Members in Attendance.

Four members and the secretary of the board of education met last evening at the high school building in their regular monthly session.

The most important piece of business of the evening was the granting of the contract for a new heating plant in the Carey school to W. P. Sutton.

A considerable of the first part of the evening was taken up in the discussion of the advisability of putting a patent weather strip on the windows on the north and west sides of the Carey and Torrence schools.

The representatives of the company claimed great savings for their invention both in the saving of fuel and the regulation of the ventilation.

Director Dunlap reported the grading of the Washington school grounds finished and that the city would be requested to roll the same and get it into good condition for next fall.

Director Dunlap was empowered to make contracts for small sections of cement walks that were needed at different buildings.

The bills as O. K'd were allowed.

A GAMBLER'S RING.

When Its Owner Deals the Cards Are an Open Book.

A curious ring seen recently is one that belongs to a gambler, one of the most famous card players in the United States. It is a heavy gold band affair and is exactly five-eighths of an inch wide. Running around the band in such a way as to completely circle it is a row of five small signets. Each one of these is worked in gold in the form of a shield. These shields are polished on their surface and bear no marking of any sort.

Inside the ring and grooved into its outer circle is another gold circle. When the ring is put on the operator's finger by a slight movement it is possible to slide the outside band around on the inner one. The instant this is done from under one of the small shields appears a minute mirror. This mirror is a scant quarter inch in diameter.

When the operator sits in at a game of cards he wears the ring on the little finger of his right hand.

When he slides the cards off the pack as he deals this little mirror comes directly under the card that is being dealt. The dealer, looking down at his hands as he deals, sees each card as it comes off the pack. He knows each card that he has dealt and exactly who has the card.

As the dealer puts the pack down by a movement either slow or fast, it is a perfectly simple matter to give the ring a slight rub, sliding it back into its original position. The mirror, even when it is exposed, is always on the inside of the hand and concealed from every one. After long practice it is possible to pull every card off the pack in such a manner that it will reflect in the exact center of the mirror.—Boston Post.

WATER POWER CO. BUYS SOME LAND

Option Exercised on Judd Farm, Situated Near Galland and Comprising Fifty-Six Acres.

THE FLOW OF WATER

Company Has Been Quite Interested in Figures, Owing to Present Low Stage of the Mississippi Now.

The Keokuk and Hamilton Water Power Company today exercised its option to purchase the Judd farm, situated a short distance above Galland. The purchase price was \$5,000, \$500 of which is turned over immediately and the balance the first of the year. The tract comprises fifty-six acres, only seven of which will be flooded. It is described as being the southeast quarter of section 13, township 66 north, range 5 west.

The Water Power Company is quite interested in the low stage of the river at the present time. The engineers have been busy measuring the flow of water. No disappointments nor surprises have been received thus far, and the figures correspond to the fraction with those estimated on gauge readings of the government since 1866 and measurements made by the company therefrom. However, it was not known how accurate these figures were.

The flow is measured by a number of cubic feet passing per second. Measurements of this kind have never been made by the government bureau here, but Major Meigs has often taken them.
