Each morning, afternoon and evening sees the natatorium alive with those who are cooling warm bodies and enjoying the delights of a plunge after the rays of a merciless old sol have gotten in their work.

—An electrical shower made its appearance last night about half past nine and kept up for an hour during which time the lightning flashed, striking here and there and ringing telephones and burning several of the instruments out. The gamewell alarm in the fire station kept up an intermittent ringing during the time the lightning was playing and burning out light wires. 
