CITY NEWS

—Smoke Moeller's Silver Ash cigar
—The Air Dome changes bill tonight.
—Harness and bugles cheap at Sherwoods.
—Tonight the all new bill will please you at the Air Dome.
—Dr. J. A. Scroggs is quite sick at his home, suffering from a wound upon his foot which occurred some time ago and which has become aggravated.
—Masonic regular meeting of Eagle lodge No. 12, A. F. & A. M., 8 o'clock Tuesday evening, August 2, 1910. Visiting brethren fraternally invited. By order of the W. M. S. H. Johnston, secretary.

—The room at the corner of Main and Sixth streets formerly occupied by the Five and Ten Cent store, has been rented by Miss Ella Fanning, who will move into the new location about the fifteenth of the present month.
—The weather summary for the month of July as just issued by Observer Gosewisch, shows that there were 16 clear days and ten thunder storms during the month. No records were broken. The mean temperature was 75 with 99 as the hottest and 57 as the coldest. The total rainfall for the month was 2.74 inches.

—Earle Y. Willis has secured a small piece of the hemp rope by which John Junkin, the murderer, was hanged in Fort Madison Friday. Many people obtained souvenirs of this kind while others silvered the pine box in which the body was shipped to Des Moines, in order that they might have a remembrance of one of Iowa's few hangings.
—The government dredge Hecla is cleaning out the accumulation of mud and sand that has gathered between the lower lock gate and the bridge draw. The Hecla is a suction dredge and draws the mud and water from the bottom and carries it through pipes out over the guard boom. A small sand bar is already formed at the mouth of the discharge pipe.
—A team attached to a wagon of lumber became frightened at an auto this morning and started on a tear but were stopped by running into the Rock Island freight house. The two men on the load were thrown off by the force of the wagon hitting the horses. Had the team continued in the direction they were headed there would probably have been considerable damage done as there were two hearse and accompanying carriages at the back side of the depot, through which the team and wagon would have passed.

—Something new and different at the Air Dome tonight.
—The new directory soon to be issued by the Iowa telephone company will contain an improvement in the numbers that will be gladly welcomed by the subscribers. Instead of having the numbers followed by the letters "R" and "B" the words Red and Blue will be used which will be easier for central to understand and also easier for the subscriber to get correctly for when they look up a number in a hurry, at a glance the letters R and B look a great deal alike. The straight line phones will be the same as at present, that is without any letter following the numbers.

—A portion of the property of St. Mary's Academy, Nauvoo, was sold at master's sale in Carthage Saturday, to satisfy an indebtedness incurred in erecting new buildings. William E. O'Neal acting as trustee for the several claimants, became the purchaser on his bid of \$375,825. Five Sisters sold life insurance policies for \$5,000 each in the British Mutual Life Insurance company. There is still indebtedness of \$250,000 on the institution in the matter connected with P. J. Kieran.

Burlington Hawk-Eye.—Frank Norton said: "I believe some of our people discovered Ottumwa the other day. To tell the truth, Burlington people know very little of the neighboring towns. Some of them have been to Fort Madison, and a few have acquaintances at Mt. Pleasant, Keokuk and Mediapolis. But 95 out of the 100 know more of Chicago, St. Louis and New York than they know of such towns as Ottumwa, Davenport, Cedar Rapids, etc. We have not been very neighborly in recent years and it seems to me that we should learn many things that would interest us, if we were to get on better terms with our neighbors. Not that we are on unfriendly terms with them. Far from it. We simply do not know them."

—The congregation of the M. E. Melrose church located near Connable station are to have a new home to worship in before the end of another month. Next Sunday will probably be the last services held in the present church as workmen will begin soon and tear down the old structure. The new church will be located on the present site but will be larger than the old church. The auditorium of the new building will be 28x40 feet, the class room 14x20 feet and the tower 12x12 feet. The farmers of the congregation have agreed to donate thirty days of work toward the work of the building. The new structure will cost in the neighborhood of \$2-100, \$1,700 of which has been already subscribed and all is expected to be raised before the new church is dedicated so that it can be occupied without the worry of debts. While the church is under construction services will be held in the school house.
